ROAD MEETING BE HELD APRIL 14TH

DATE CHANGED FROM APRIL 7. EVERY COUNTY IN STATE WILL BE REPRESENTED, IS PROMISE. ARGUMENT IS FILED

PORTLAND, March 30.—The convention of supporters of the road bonding act is called for Saturday, April 14, instead of April 7, as was first announced. That the meeting will be representative of every county in Oregon is assured from the correspondence received at the road campaign headquarters.

Chairman W. A. Wood has filed the formal argument in favor of the \$4,000,000 road bonding issue. Amortization tables, showing that the interest and principal on the bonds will be met from the millage tax and auto license fees, are set forth and demonstrate that in addition there will be balances each year for state roads without any increase in general taxation.

From the Grange argument favoring the state bonding measure in 1912 the following is quoted: "Business men and farmer, producer and consumer, vote for the Grange measures, for you one and all are interested in the development of the state; that can never be accomplished without the construction of good, permanent roads, built economically and scientifically. Spence, Shaw, Leedy, Mason, Committee, Oregon State Grange." (Page 101, 1912 State pamphlet.)

OREGON'S CLAMS LOADED WITH JOY

INCIDENTALLY THE CLAM'S JOY. FULNESS WILL BE REFLECTED IN HOMES OF THOSE WHO VISIT THE BEACHES

ASTORIA, Or., March 30.—There is much joy in the hearts of clams along the Oregon and Washington coast today and incidentally that joy will be reflected in the hearts of many thousands who sojourn annually on the beaches.

The cause of all this joy is the storms which have been raging during the winter along the coast. Clams, according to their closest students, thrive best when the storm rages hardest—at least, do those clams along the Oregon and Washington coasts.

Great beds of kelp parallel the coast 200 miles from land. Clams subsist on seaweed, and kelp is one of their favorite articles of diet. If there were no seaweeds, there would be no clams.
