

Who Discovered the Golden Gate Is Query

"War of Historians" Around Bay City Is Now in Progress—Attacks and Counter Attacks Popular

OAKLAND, March 29.—The "war of the historians" is on and the cause of the question: "Who found the Golden Gate?" Oakland started it—the same Oakland that asked the twenty-seven other Oaklanders in the United States to give up that name so that it could have a monopoly. It claims the Golden Gate by right of prior discovery—that same Golden Gate which inspired Bret Harte to write so cynically of San Francisco: "Sweet, indifferent of (correct) fate, Thou sittest by the Western Gate. But San Francisco by no means is sweet or indifferent. It has called the antiquarians to the colors and the paving over of dusty old Spanish documents, maps and diaries of the days of the conquistadores fills the air with dust and debate. Oakland points to the diary of Father Juan Crespi, who, with Captain Pedro Fages, was sent out by Don Gaspar de Portola, discoverer of San Francisco bay, to circle that "great estuary" as the early Spanish called it. KLAMATH BOYS IN COAST ARTILLERY

TWO ALREADY BELONG AND EXPECT CALL DAILY WHILE THIRD, ALL ATTENDING UNIVERSITY, EXPECTS TO JOIN

If the call to arms comes, Klamath Falls, despite her present remote distance from the centers of activities, and without a vestige at present of a military organization, will be represented in several of the first state units to go out, some of which have already been called. Among the members of the Third Coast artillery company at Eugene from this city are Leland Haines and Edwin Cox, now students in the university but who are members of this military organization. Another Klamath boy now at the university who expects to join the medical corps of the Third Oregon regiment and may have done so already, is Ralph Hurn, son of Mrs. Geo. P. Hurn of this city. Word received from Hurn says that little is being thought of at the university but preparations for war and nearly every student in college, men and women, are taking special courses in military training and tactics. The Third company of the Coast artillery, while drilled in field work, is maintained to be used at the coast forts near Astoria and the Columbia river. The Coast artillery is being held in readiness and will probably either go direct to Fort Stevens, the designated mobilization camp, or out on state guard duty.

Her plans for the project will be one of the important features presented at the biennial national session of the Federation in Portland, Ore., July 10-13 inclusive.

WOMEN SMOKE AT WORK IN ENGLAND

LONDON, March 15.—(By Mail)—Women in England who smoke outnumber their American sisters possessed of the same weakness. One sees in the restaurants as many who smoke as who do not. It remained for the war to remove the next to last restriction. They are now smoking while at work in at least one London office. The last restriction will go when they are seen smoking in the streets.

Male army clerks always have been permitted to smoke while at work. Failing heir to many the clerks' jobs the women have fallen heir to the habit also. The only regulation prescribed is that they must not smoke before 11 o'clock or after 3 p. m.

Misses Death Owing to Peculiar Conditions

Because There Is no Place to Hang Him Indian Will Probably Serve Life Sentence, Instead of Death

SPOKANE, Wash., March 30.—Because there is no place in which to hang him, Edward Mayberry, half-breed Indian, probably will escape the death sentence imposed for the murder of Alice Vivian on the Colville reservation last August.

President Wilson granted Mayberry a thirty-day respite so his lawyers could appeal from the sentence on the ground that it could not be legally carried out in the state of Washington, where capital punishment is barred. This respite will expire a week from Sunday.

The woman killed by Mayberry was alleged to be his wife. He said the shooting was accidental. As it occurred on federal government property, United States Judge Rudkin went ahead and condemned Mayberry

to death, in spite of Washington's law against executions. The original hanging date was January 19.

Mayberry obtained a postponement until March. Then it was necessary to find a place inside the state boundaries and yet not under state jurisdiction where a gallows could be legally erected. The federal building was deemed United States territory and plans were made to hang Mayberry on the roof. His lawyers objected and demanded a ruling by the treasury department. Mayberry remained calm and carpenters began measuring off a place to build the scaffold.

The treasury department ruled that the plan was illegal. President Wilson granted Mayberry a reprieve to April 10, at which time he will be imprisoned for life, likely.
