WESTERN DEPARTMENT CAMP
PLAN INCLUDES ONE AT SANTA
BARBARA ON JUNE 2 AND AN-
OTHER ON JULY 7

WASHINGTON, D. C. March 31.—The war department has announced the schedule for the civilian training camps.

The western department camp plan include one at Santa Barbara, which is to open on June 2. A second camp will be held there beginning July 7.

MADRID, March 31.—The Spanish cabinet has suspended all constitutional guarantees and action has been taken amounting to practical martial law throughout Spain.

How the Doctors Learn if You Are a Victim of Tuberculosis



This photograph shows a physician of the Life Extension Institute, which has former President Taft as chairman of its board of directors, testing the lungs for signs of tuberculosis.

To detect tuberculosis or other lung affection, it is necessary to listen thoroughly through the stethoscope over every square inch of the surface covering the lungs. Special attention, however, is given to the upper portions of the lungs or the apices. The most important areas are below and above the collar bone and along the back margin of the shoulder blade.

By such examination the early

stages of tuberculosis can often be detected before any symptoms have developed. This would warrant a diagnosis of such trouble. Faulty posture and faulty habits of breathing, and poor chest development are also noted and offer opportunity for guiding the individual in the prevention of tuberculosis and other lung affection.

Extremely critical examinations are necessary to determine very early changes, especially when they are deep seated. A hemorrhage may be the first real warning that a patient has who has not taken the precaution of having a complete physical examination.

REPRESENTATIVES OF COMMER-
CIAL CLUBS WILL FORM AN
ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO

PORTLAND, Ore., March 31.—Representatives of the commercial clubs and county courts from all parts of Oregon gather here today to form an advisory committee in connection with the expenditure of funds appropriated by the last legislature to promote tourist travel to Oregon, Washington and British Columbia. State officials are also interested in the session.

"The conferees will have no real power in expending the money," said Mark Wodruff, director of the Northwest Tourist association, in explaining the nature of the meeting. "but it seems no more than right that the various sections of the state should have some voice in the spending of the money."

Wilson Writes Mrs. Caminetti
WASHINGTON, D. C., March 31.—The president has written the mother of F. Drew Caminetti in response to her appeals to pardon him on the white slave charge. He refused on account of "imperative duty." He said the "dictates of his heart" favored a pardon, but that he feared the influence on other cases.
