UNEMPLOYED WILL HAVE JOBS NOW

DEMAND FOR WORKERS IN MUNITIONS AND OTHER FACTORIES IN THE EAST WILL SUPPLY WORK FOR UNEMPLOYED

LOS ANGELES, April 3.—Preparedness is about to bring employment to the unemployed of southern California, according to Edward Tylan, of the local board of civil service examiners, the eastern centers cannot meet the increased demand for labor and already 100 Los Angeles unemployed have filed applications for work in government munitions factories.

The government has sent out a call for one thousand workmen on jobs paying from \$1.50 to \$5 per day and it was for these places that the applications were made.

The government wants men in the Frankford Arsenal, Philadelphia; the Picatinny Arsenal of Dover, N. Y.; the Watertown Arsenal of Watertown, Mass.; the Watervliet Arsenal of Watervliet, N. Y., and the navy yards at Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Norfolk and Washington, D. C.
