U. S. OFFICIAL SAYS TO PREPARE

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 5.—National preparedness for war has ceased to be the theme for argument. Congress and other Federal agencies are now occupied with questions of ways and means. However, today we face the question of individual preparedness, about which little has yet been said, but which is as vital a question as the other.

We are not only a matter of gunpowder and lead; it is just as much a matter of food and forage. Comparatively few are in position to serve their country in actual firing line, but there is no man, woman or half-grown child, who can not serve on the forage line, if only by tending a bed of green vegetables. Such service may not be exciting; may not seem glorious—yet in the long run it may be as useful as the service of the man who dies for his country on the field of battle. It is not inconceivable that the time may come when such humble service, loyally performed by thousands of patriots a thousand miles away from any battle line, may turn the balance upon which hangs our very existence as free people.

We produce more than enough food for ourselves, but in war there will be danger that people may starve because our food reserves are in remote elevators and storage plants and our railroads are too busy hauling troops and munitions to carry food to the civilian population. Thus the government would be embarrassed by the problem of meeting local shortages of food at a time when all its energies should be focused upon national defense. Incidentally, from time to time prices of some necessities of life may become prohibitive, even though food be available. Hence it is as imperative that the individual meet the problem of home food supply as that congress should look to national food preparedness.

Individual preparedness in cities should take form this spring by the planting of hundreds of thousands of door-yard gardens, where before there was only sod or bare earth. In the country it should take the form of more intensive cultivation; even of a measure of training on the part of women and girls that they may be prepared to ride the sulky plow or the binder if the worst comes. Everywhere it should take the form of scrupulous care in the production, use, and conservation of foods.

MOST OF OREGON BIRDS ARE FRIENDS OF FARMERS

ONLY A FEW OF THE FEATHERED FOLK NOT WELCOMED—THEY ARE VERY HELPFUL IN DESTROYING PESTS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, April 5.—In all Oregon's four regions of animal life, among the 400 or 450 distinct species of birds found in the state only a mere half dozen are harmful to Mr. Farmer or Mr. Gardener or to anyone at all. The unwelcome ones are, to dispense with the disagreeable thing first, the great horned owl, which kills poultry; the shrike, or butcher bird, which preys on smaller birds; the cooper and the sharp-shinned hawk, foes of poultry, game birds and song birds; and the jays, which rob other nests and destroy the young of smaller birds.

The climatic and geographical conditions of Oregon divide the state into four distinct sections, eastern Oregon, western Oregon, southern Oregon, and the coast regions. This fact is responsible for the state's wealth of bird and animal life.

The coast regions, for instance, are the direct routes of migration for the shore birds, and there, sandpipers, surf birds, gulls and surf ducks abound.

Western Oregon, in turn, is known among zoologists as the region of the transition forests, and the territory is rich in the bird life familiar to all lovers of the university campus—crested jays, tanagers, chickadees

and purple finches. Here, too, are the famous game birds of Oregon, the pheasant, quail and grouse, and ducks in plenty.

Eastern Oregon is a far country from this and much of it is called the region of the upper Sonoran deserts. Desert sparrows, pinion jays, sage thrush and magpies are the rule there, while the lakes are alive with ducks, geese and other game birds.

Southern Oregon is the intermediate land between the wet, humid portions of western Oregon and the dry California regions. Many California species never come farther north than this territory.

An approximate list of Lane county land birds recently compiled and issued by the zoology department of the university shows 148 species for this region alone, and in the list no water birds of any type were included.

Almost none of these are injurious to crops, while even the birds of prey find themselves welcomed into the best society for their service in killing rodents, gophers and insects.
