

WEST COAST LUMBER MEN TO FIGHT FREIGHT RATES

MEETING HELD IN PORTLAND BY
PROMINENT LUMBER MANU-
FACTURERS TO PROTEST THE
INCREASE IN RATES

PORTLAND, April 5.—A deter-
mined fight against the petition of
the railroads for a flat increase of 15
per cent on both class and commo-
dity rates is under way here today
by the West Coast Lumbermen's As-
sociation. The directors and traffic
committee were authorized to appear
before the interstate commerce com-
mission to oppose the move of the
railroads.

The lumbermen contend that the
Adamson law, on which the railroads
base their claim, will not increase the
operating costs of American rail-
roads \$47,000,000 annually, as the
roads allege. They say that the in-
creased operating costs will not be
over \$4,000,000 or \$5,000,000. The
lumbermen also contend that this is

not the logical time for the increase
in lumber rates, as the industry can-
not stand it.

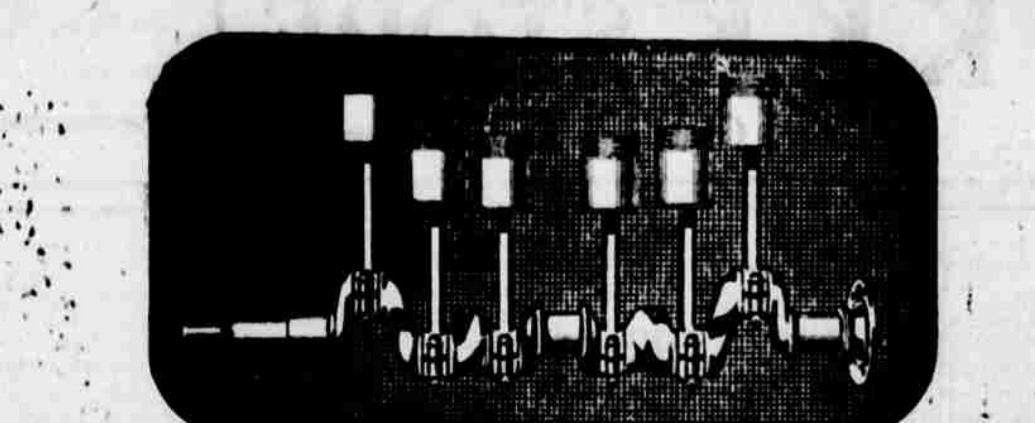

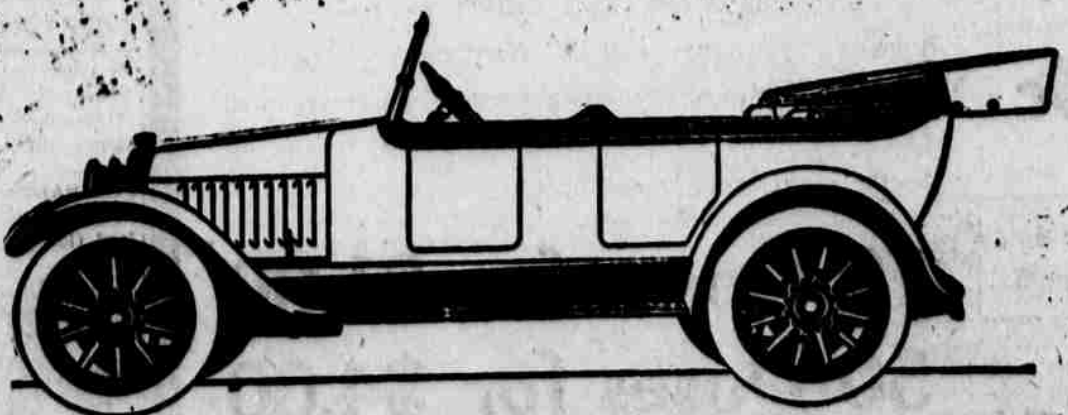
