STEPS ARE TAKEN TO SUPPLY LARGE ARMY

ARRANGEMENTS BEING MADE TO FEED 500,000 MEN AND SPECULATORS IN PANIC BECAUSE OF GOVERNMENT'S INTENTION

CHICAGO, April 6.—That the government has already taken steps to secure a food supply sufficient for an army of 500,000 men was learned here this week when army and federal officials went into closed conference at the Federal building to formulate plans for drastic action. Meeting with the government officials are H. B. Lyford, chairman of the Chicago committee of the Council for National Defense; Colonel Frank Eastman, depot quartermaster; Major H. G. Sharp, quartermaster general, and Col. Albert Knutson, quartermaster of the central division of the army.

Simultaneously with the news of the conference came the announcement that Chicago packers had been ordered by the government to hold five million pounds of meat in reserve. This will be taken as soon as war is declared, it was stated.

The government, one official said, will fix its own prices on foodstuffs, at the cost to the supply house. A small profit, to be determined by the government, will be added. As far as possible all supplies will be purchased direct from the producer. Supply houses must also give preference to government orders, regardless to profit offered by other buyers. Speculators here who have acquired large quantities of foodstuffs in anticipation of war are in a panic.

License Bargain Sale On SALEM, Ore., April 6.—The state of Oregon is conducting a big bargain sale of fishing licenses today, and every day hereafter until May 21. The license that is now selling for \$1 will cost \$1.50 after that date when new game laws enacted by the last legislature go into effect. The sale rule applies to hunting licenses.

Professor Wants Excitement EUGENE, April 6.—"You bet," said Prof. Allan C. Hopkins, of the school of commerce of the University of Oregon, when asked today if he were going to war. Claiming that when he goes to war he must have excitement, Hopkins declared that he is much interested in the dispatch service.

TIMES HAVE CHANGED SINCE DAD COURTED

FRESHMEN OF UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA SAY A COLLEGE MAN SHOULD HAVE AN INCOME BEFORE MARRYING

MISSOULA, Mont., April 6.—A college man should have an annual income of between \$2,000 and \$3,000 before he marries, in the opinion of many men and women of the University of Montana freshmen class, who have written themes on the subject, "The High Cost of a Home."

On the other hand, there is comment like this from the women: "If I loved a man I'd marry him, though he be a poor farmer or a multi-millionaire."
