CALIFORNIA LIQUOR FIGHT WILL CLOSE

END IS EXPECTED BEFORE EXPIRATION OF PRESENT WEEK WITH ACTION OF VARIOUS BILLS UP FOR DISCUSSION

SACRAMENTO, April 10.—Before the close of this week the liquor fight will probably be at an end so far as the legislature is concerned. An effort will be made to get the Ashley saloon regulation bill to a vote in the assembly before the Rominger anti-saloon, anti-strong drink bill is voted on. That is part of the legislative jockeying that is to be done.

No one contends that there is any public demand for the passage of the Ashley bill. The grapevines organizations are not for it; there are no petitions for it, and it is a pretty safe assertion that the saloonmen themselves would be against it if the Rominger bill was not pending. It is now the aim of the wet leaders to put the assembly on record in favor of the "tame" Ashley bill before considering the more drastic Rominger bill.

The Rominger bill will wipe out the saloons and the treating habit. That is admitted by everyone. The Ashley bill would allow one saloon to every 500 population.

Both bills allow cafes, restaurants and hotels to serve liquor with meals, except that under the Rominger bill the strongest liquor that could be served would be light wines and beer. Under the Ashley bill there is no limit placed on the percentage of alcohol in beverages. The Ashley bill provides for Sunday and midnight closing. The Rominger bill provides that wine and beer may be served only with meals and only at meal times.

Ashley makes the argument for his bill that the saloon forces would not attempt to hold it up by referendum as they would the Rominger bill. Which, if true, demonstrates that the Ashley bill is not expected to curtail the saloon evil to any noticeable extent.

30,000 BRITISH SALOONS TO BE CLOSED SOON

LONDON, April 10.—Thirty thousand British saloons probably will be closed within the next few months.

English brewers themselves have suggested a sweeping measure on these lines as the solution of difficulties arising from the restricted output of beer. At present, they say, there are far too many distributing agencies, a third of which could be put out of business without inconveniencing the public, while trade would be carried on more economically.

England must quench its thirst on ten million barrels of beer a year or go thirsty, under the recent government restrictions, and the brewers are hurrying to meet the contingency.

In the rural districts, instead of three breweries competing for business in one locality through thirty saloons, twenty of them will be discontinued and one joint firm will supply all the beer to the ten.

MILLION WOMEN TO THE FIELDS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—Without going beyond their own door-yards millions of American women can render real service to the nation. This service is as real as that rendered by the soldier on the field of battle. It is to plant and care for a little plot of land that lies back of the house—to make a home garden.

One million door-yard gardens planted in our suburbs and cities this spring would mean a national saving of possibly \$50,000,000, a sum as large as that which President McKinley was given by congress for the prosecution of the Spanish-American war. Growing vegetables for home consumption in these gardens would relieve the railroads of the necessity of carrying millions of pounds of bulky freight thus releasing thousands of cars and engines for hauling men and munitions.

Our experts have calculated that an average American family uses about 20 bushels of potatoes a year. It does not take but a fraction of an acre to produce this quantity of this important foodstuff since a fair yield of this crop is 200 bushels in a season, and it is not uncommon for potatoes to run to 400 or more bushels per acre.

Radishes, lettuce, early beets, beans, peas, tomatoes, spinach and numerous easily cultivated vegetables can be raised in the back yard provided the soil is fertile and intelligent is employed in the process.

There is no reason in the world why 3,000,000 back-yard gardens should not be planted this spring, planted as soon as the ground is warm enough and supply 3,000,000 families with good, cheap, nutritious foods all this summer, war or no war.

The hitherto wasted resource of our door-yard land should be utilized at once. It is no more work for a woman to tend a vegetable garden than it is to tend a flower garden or a house plant. At present it is more patriotic to subordinate flowers to food.

SALEM, April 10.—With the view of preventing any possible controversies between the federal government and state over waters available in Southern Oregon for the irrigation of Indian lands on the Klamath Indian reservation, State Engineer Lewis and officials of the reservation agency had a conference last week.

While nothing definite was decided upon, a result of the conference will probably be that the agency officials will file with the engineer plans for the projects on the reservation for which water will be needed. This would prevent the water board, in adjudicating water rights on the streams, from appropriating water belonging to the Indians by virtue of their treaty with the government.

According to the state engineer there are six projects on the reservation, and their acreage is as follows: Modoc Point irrigation project, 9135 acres; Modoc Point drainage project, 10,000 acres; Agency unit, 7000 acres; Yainax project, 23,000 acres; Upper Klamath March project, 80,000 acres; and Syran Marsh, 18,000 acres.
