PROFESSOR BENES APPEALS TO BOHEMIANS

TALKS MALIN PEOPLE OF STRUGGLES AND CONDITIONS IN THEIR NATIVE LAND AND LAUDS AMERICA'S PRINCIPLES

(Klamath County Special Service) MALIN, April 12.—"The right of any nation to self-government and independence is a self-evident truth from the force of which debate or discussion could merely detract," said Prof. Vojta Benes, representative of the Bohemian Independence Committee, in his address at Malin last night.

"At present the smaller European nations are in danger of losing or continuing to be deprived of this right in consequence of the great war, and several of them have been knocking at our doors, asking for encouragement."

Professor Benes escaped from Bohemia (in Austria) in 1915, during the great war and became a member of the Independence Committee, which, under the leadership of Professor Masaryk, who is at present lecturing at the universities of London and Paris, is voicing the ancient right of the Bohemian nation to freedom and independence. Professor Benes has been lecturing through the United States in all large Bohemian settlements and his work has proved a great success, as all the Americans of Bohemian extraction are enthusiastically welcoming the liberation of Bohemia.

"Without in the least desiring to detract from the merits of the case of any other nation, let us look to that of the Bohemian country which, while always claiming independent sovereignty, is today a part of the Austrian empire, as well as our brethren in Slovakia," said the professor.

"Bohemia has long formulated part of the Austrian empire, but her people have always regarded the union purely as personal, through the person of the emperor, who is also king of Bohemia.

the people of Bohemia voluntarily surrendered the rights they have fought and bled for, and they have been recognized even by the dead Emperor Francis Joseph, when, on the 18th day of October, 1911, he proclaimed: 'We gladly recognize the rights of this kingdom and are ready to renew this recognition by taking our coronation oath.'

"On the ground of her historic political rights Bohemia claims her freedom. She claims it also because it alone can atone for suffering which the government of Austria has inflicted upon her through several generations by persecution, by excessive taxation, which has long burdened her beyond all other parts of the empire, by the neglect of her educationally and materially, as well as political interests, and finally by driving her people into the present unholy war on the side of absolutism and tyranny contrary to their every tradition and sentiment.

"The attention of those who may think it not wise to divide Europe into many small nations is called to the fact that if the territory of the old kingdom of Bohemia and Slovakia is included in the new free country, there will be but seven larger states in Europe in population, namely: Russia, England, Germany, France, Italy, Poland and Spain, while the following will be smaller: Portugal, Hungary, Holland, Denmark, Belgium, Sweden, Switzerland, Norway, Montenegro, Bulgaria, Serbia, Turkey, Roumania and Greece.

"The Americans of Bohemian extraction, while they recognize a bond of sympathy between themselves and the people of their fathers in Bohemia and Slovakia, they stand primarily as American citizens, imbued with American ideals, proud and appreciative of the advantages which they here enjoy, and moved by its congress, to assist in bringing like blessings to a worthy people whose principles and ideals of government are so much like our own."
