TRUMB-NAIL SKETCHES

Men Who Run U. S. Navy

Admiral McGowan

WASHINGTON, April 14.—

The man who supplies the fleet with its vast quantities of "housekeeping" supplies—food, fuel and other stores—is Admiral McGowan, Chief of the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts.

The navy names him as the man who has made "a smoothly running military machine of the great supply system. Under his regime great strides have been made in furnishing the fleet at an instant's notice with all it needs for any task. His is the business side of the navy, which calls for sound business judgment. He was selected for the post because of his "remarkable efficiency" as fleet master.

McGowan is one of the best looking men in the navy. He has the strength and forcefulness of a giant, weighs about 300 solid muscled pounds, has a voice like a bull, and is as democratic and companionable as a politician running for office.

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
