to the proposed initiative franchise

ORDINANCE No. 411

An Ordinance Giving and Granting to the Keno Power Company, a franchise and Right to Erect, Maintain, Use and Remove, Poles, Wires, Cables, Ducts, Appliances and Apparatus for Conducting and Using Electricity in, Under and Upon Any and All Streets, Alleys, Roads and Ways in the City of Klamath Falls, in the County of Klamath, State of Oregon, Within the Limits and Boundaries of Said City, as Said City Now is, or Hereafter May Be Bounded or Constituted, and Have its Limits, and to Supply Electric Energy to the People and Inhabitants of the City of Klamath Falls, and to the Public, and to Charge and Collect Tolls Therefor.

THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Keno Power Company, a corporation of Oregon, for and during the term hereinafter provided be, and hereby is granted, subject to the considerations and conditions in this ordinance contained, a franchise and right, but not an exclusive franchise and right, to erect, maintain, use and remove, poles, wires, cables, ducts, appliances and apparatus for providing and using electricity in, under, over and upon any and all streets, alleys, roads, and ways of, or in said city, within the limits and boundaries of said city, as the same is now, or hereafter may be bounded, constituted, and have its limits, both for the purpose of furnishing and supplying electrical energy for any and all purposes to the public and to the people and inhabitants of the said City of Klamath Falls, and of enabling or assisting the Keno Power Company, to carry on its business elsewhere than in said city, as now or hereafter bounded and constituted, in supplying other towns, cities, their inhabitants and the public with electricity; also the franchise and right to furnish and supply to the public and to the people and inhabitants of the City of Klamath Falls, electrical energy for any and all purposes, and to establish, charge and collect tolls and charges therefor.

Section 2. That the said Keno Power Company shall erect, maintain

and use such poles, wires, cables, ducts, appliances and apparatus in accordance with the general laws of the State, and with all ordinances of the City of Klamath Falls governing the erection and maintenance of the same, now or hereafter provided, so as not to interfere with the free and unobstructed use of said streets or roads for travel. All poles of the said Keno Power Company shall be erected at the edge of the sidewalk unless otherwise directly provided by the proper city authorities, and all poles shall be as near as possible on lot lines. The City of Klamath Falls by its proper constituted authority shall have the right to cause the said Keno Power Company to move the location of any pole or wire, whenever the removal thereof shall be deemed for the public convenience and the expenses thereof shall be paid by the said Keno Power Company.

Section 3. It is expressly provided that in case the limits or boundaries of said city at any time or times, are made less or smaller than they were, or existed prior thereto, all said franchises, rights and privileges shall continue and exist, as to the part or parts of said city theretofore included in its limits or boundaries, as though said limits or boundaries had not been so made less or smaller.

Section 4. Said Keno Power Company, under the direction of the City of Klamath Falls or its properly constituted authority, may make all necessary excavations in any street, alley, road or way, for the purpose of erecting, maintaining, using or removing any of such poles, wires, cables, ducts, appliances and apparatus, and for repairing the same. When any excavation shall be made pursuant to the provisions of this franchise, the said Keno Power Company shall without delay, put such streets, alleys, roads or way, in as good condition as it was before it was so broken up, dug up, or disturbed, and such surface, earth and any other material caused by such excavation shall be removed by said Keno Power Company; and all said work shall be done in strict compliance with the rules, regulations, ordinances or resolutions which may be adopted from time to time during the continuance of this franchise by the legislative body of said city, or as may be otherwise provided by law. It is further provided that the proper city authority may require that any opening in any hard surfaced street, or any street, alley, road or way shall be filled in, and the pavement replaced by the city authorities and the cost thereof, including the cost of inspection and supervision shall be paid by the said Keno Power Company, and the city authorities may require a deposit in the treasury of the said city of a sum of money sufficient to pay said cost, to be made by the said Keno Power Company, before the opening of any such street, road or way shall be begun; provided further, that the Keno Power Company shall before beginning installation of its distributing system submit to the common council, plans and specifications approved by the city engineer covering such installation and all proposed extensions, and the excavation of all streets occupied by the said Keno Power Company with such proposed distributing system; provided further that all installations of such system shall be made subject to the rules, regulations and restrictions of the City of Klamath Falls and the Public Service Commission of the State of Oregon.

Section 5. Extensions to the existing distributing system of the said Keno Power Company, authorized by the terms of this franchise shall be made throughout the said city when necessary to meet the reasonable demands of the growth of said city, and the said Keno Power Company shall furnish during the life of this franchise, reasonable, adequate and safe service, equipment and facilities within said City of Klamath Falls, and co-extensive with any competing company furnishing such service.

Section 6. Said Keno Power Company hereby agrees and covenants to indemnify and save harmless the City of Klamath Falls, and the officers thereof, against all damages, costs and expenses whatsoever to which it or they may be subject in consequence of the acts of the said Keno Power Company, or its agents or servants, in any manner arising from the rights and privileges hereby granted.

Section 7. All rights, authority and grants herein contained or conferred are also conditional upon the understanding and agreement that these privileges in the streets, alleys, roads or ways of the city are not to operate in any way so as to be an enhancement of said Keno Power Company's property or values or to be an asset or item of ownership in any appraisal thereof in the event that the value of the property of the said Keno Power Company devoted to the public use within said City of Klamath Falls, shall ever be in issue in any proceeding or controversy involving the question of rates or services to be afforded within said City by said Keno Power Company.

This franchise and grant shall not be construed as any limitation upon the

said City of Klamath Falls through its proper officers to grant rights or privileges or authority to other persons or corporations similar to, or different than those herein set forth in the same streets, alleys, roads or ways of the said City.

Section 8. All rights and privileges hereby granted shall terminate at the expiration of twenty-five (25) years from the date of the acceptance of the terms and conditions of this ordinance by the said Keno Power Company, and in the event that the said Keno Power Company shall fail or neglect, or refuse to perform all or any of the obligations and requirements called for by this ordinance to be performed by it, this grant and privilege may be terminated and annulled by the common council or other legislative body of the City of Klamath Falls, and the said Keno Power Company shall forfeit all rights and privileges hereby granted.

Section 9. The rights and privileges granted by this ordinance are granted upon the conditions herein contained and also upon the following considerations and conditions, to-wit:

(a) That the said Keno Power Company shall within sixty (60) days from and after the passage and approval of this ordinance, file with the Recorder of the City of Klamath Falls, its written acceptance of this ordinance granted to, and conferred upon, said Keno Power Company, subject to all of the terms, obligations, restrictions and provisions in this ordinance contained, and upon the expiration of the allotted time for the acceptance of this ordinance, the same not having been accepted unconditionally, this ordinance shall become wholly void, inoperative and of no effect.

(b) That the said Keno Power Company shall permit the City of Klamath Falls to have the right to string wires on all of the poles of the said Keno Power Company for municipal, fire, police and water departments, and for municipal telephone and telegraph systems, provided that the same shall be so strung as to interfere as little as possible with the wires of said Keno Power Company, and further that the said Keno Power Company shall not be responsible for any damage resulting to the wires or property of the City, or injuries to persons, resulting from the using of its said poles by the City.

(c) That all of the physical property of the Keno Power Company constructed, installed, used or intended to be used within the said City in, or in connection with the operation of the plant of the said Keno Power Company, constructed, installed, maintained and used under the provisions of this ordinance from and after the construction or installation, or the acquisition of title thereto by the Keno Power Company, be subject to the provisions of this section.

(d) The said Keno Power Company shall not during the term of this franchise sell, assign, transfer or convey this franchise, or any portion of its physical property in said City subject to the provisions of this ordinance without the consent of the common council of the City of Klamath Falls, expressed by an ordinance first obtained, and that upon obtaining such consent all of the provisions shall inure to, and apply to, and bind the successors and assigns of the said Keno Power Company; and whenever the said Keno Power Company shall be mentioned in this ordinance, it shall be understood to include such successors or assigns in interest of the Keno Power Company, as shall have been so consented to by the common council.

(e) That said Keno Power Company shall within sixty (60) days from the date of its acceptance of this franchise, begin the actual work of installing its said system within the City of Klamath Falls, and shall with due diligence prosecute such work to completion, so as to afford full and adequate service to and in all portions and districts of said city not later than December 1st, 1919, subject to forfeiture of its rights under this franchise for failure to do so. And provided further that at the time of acceptance of this franchise, the said Keno Power Company shall file with the Police Judge of the City of Klamath Falls an indemnity bond in the sum of fifteen thousand (\$15,000) dollars with surety or sureties subject to approval by the common council of said City, the said bond to be conditioned upon compliance by said Keno Power Company with the provisions of this subsection (e), the said sum named in said bond to be considered liquidated damages deemed and agreed to have been suffered by said City by reason of the failure of said Keno Power Company to comply with the terms of this subsection (e), and recoverable in addition to or without forfeiture of said Keno Power Company's rights and privileges under this franchise.

Section 10. Said Keno Power Company shall render the service, as hereinafter authorized to be supplied, by the best apparatus known to the science of electricity, to secure the least danger to life or property compatible with the best obtainable service, and such service shall be supplied on equal terms, under like conditions, and without un-

just discrimination, or without undue preference to any commercial user within said City of Klamath Falls; and at all times the power and right to reasonably regulate the exercise of the rights and privileges of the franchise hereby granted and determined, shall be vested in the council of said City, subject to the general laws of the State of Oregon.

Section 11. The use of the poles or other equipment, on, over or under any street, alley, road or way in the said City, under the provisions of this ordinance shall be upon the express terms, that the said Keno Power Company shall for a reasonable compensation permit the use of the same by any other public utility whenever public convenience or necessity require such use, and such use will not result in irreparable injury to the owner or other users of such poles or other equipment, nor in any way be a detriment to the service to be rendered by such owners or other users. The said parties shall share the cost necessitated thereby as they may agree thereon, and may agree upon rules and regulations therefor, subject to the provisions of the general laws of this State.

Section 12. That in consideration of the rights and privileges herein granted, and as compensation for this franchise, said Keno Power Company upon its acceptance of this ordinance shall pay to the City of Klamath Falls, the sum of two hundred (\$200.00) dollars; and as additional compensation shall pay to said city two and one-half (2½%) per centum of its annual gross receipts derived from business within the corporate limits of said city. The amount of such annual gross receipts shall be determined from the annual report of said Keno Power Company made to the Public Service Commission of the State of Oregon, and the percentage thereof payable as herein provided shall be paid to said city within ten (10) days after said company has so made its said annual report.

Section 13. At the expiration of the term for which this franchise is granted, the said city at its own election, and upon payment thereof of a fair valuation to be determined as hereinafter provided, may purchase and take over to itself the property and plant of the said Keno Power Company (in its entirety) used in connection therewith. The value of such property and plant shall be ascertained by the Public Service Commission of the State of Oregon or such other body or commission as may then be similarly empowered, and such sum so ascertained shall be deemed a fair valuation, and so accepted by the parties hereto.

Section 14. The Keno Power Company is hereby granted the right and privilege of demanding and charging from their patrons for electric lighting and electric power, heating and other uses of electricity contemplated under the provisions hereof, not to exceed the following rates:

METER SCHEDULE

- (1) Lighting.
 - a. 10¢ per K.W.H. (Std. L.F.) 10 hr. base.
- (2) Motors.
 - a. 10¢ per K.W.H. (Std. L.F.) 10 hr. base.
 - b. 10¢ per K.W.H. (Std. L.F.) 24 hr. base.
- (3) Heating.
 - a. 10¢ per K.W.H. (Std. L.F.) 10 hr. base.

FLAT RATE SCHEDULE

- (1) Lighting—Commercial.
 - a. 1¢ per Watt Month for 100 Watts or less.
 - b. 1¢ per Watt Month for all over 100 Watts.
- (2) Lighting—Residential.
 - a. 1¢ per Watt Month for 100 Watts or less.
 - b. 1¢ per Watt Month for all over 100 Watts.
- (3) Power.
 - a. 2¢ per H.P. Month.
 - b. 2¢ per H.P. Month up to 2 H.P. for domestic use.
 - c. 2¢ per H.P. for irrigation or drainage only.
- (4) Heating.
 - a. 1¢ per Watt Month up to 1000 Watts.
 - b. 1¢ per Watt Month for all over 1000 Watts.

MINIMUM RATES

- a. Lighting: 1¢ per K.W.H.
- b. Heating: 1.5¢ per K.W.H.
- c. Single Phase, 21¢ per Month.
- d. Three Phase, 21.5¢ per Month.
- e. Motors, 50¢ per H.P. Month up to 40 H.P.
- f. 25¢ for 40 H.P. or over.

Section 15. Whenever it shall become necessary to cut the wires of said Company erected under this privilege for the purpose of removing buildings, or for any other legitimate purpose, the same shall be done and the wires replaced by and at the expense of said Company, or its successors or assigns upon receiving 24 hours notice from any person, firm, or corporation that desires to and has received permission to remove any building or structure the moving of which will necessitate the cutting or raising of the wires of said Company.
