WAR EVIDENCE PLAINLY SHOWN AT BREMERTON

"All persons operating vessels, boats, skiffs, etc., other than those belonging to the naval and military forces of the United States are warned to keep out of the waters adjacent to the navy yard, and not to approach closer than 500 feet to the line between the ends of Coaling Pier No. 1 and Pier No. 2.

"Vessels or boats disregarding this warning will be fired upon."

THUMB-NAIL SKETCHES

Men Who Run U. S. Navy

Near Admiral David W. Taylor.

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The center-fire control for dreadnaughts whereby main gun batteries are located in a line down the center of the ship, is one of the revolutions of naval construction contributed to the world by American naval genius.

Rear Admiral David W. Taylor, recognized as one of the leading authorities on naval construction, is the man who originated "center-fire."

He is now chief of the Bureau of Construction and Repair. His job is to draw the intricate detail plans and specifications for the navy's new ships, and after afloat, to keep them ship-shape. No one branch of the naval establishment is more vital than his; perhaps none so much so.

Admiral Taylor inaugurated his brilliant career with the navy by graduating with top honors from the Annapolis academy, and then entering the great English naval academy when England was receiving our midshipmen. Taylor carried off the highest honors ever won at that academy.

When the British cruiser Hawk rammed the steamship Olympia in the Thames several years ago the British government sent for Admiral Taylor to obtain his expert opinion as to the cause of the mysterious collision.

It is chiefly due to his efforts that the present super-dreadnaught can travel faster and with greater displacement on the same amount of coal than the pre-dreadnaught could.

Taylor is one of the meekest men to look at in the world. He has the face, bearing and general appearance of a country preacher. He thinks so far ahead in warship construction that he's generally about the same distance behind in the matter of prevailing styles for men's clothing.

CROP OUTLOOK AND DEMAND PROMISING

PORTLAND EDITOR GIVES OPINION ON CONDITIONS NEAR CIVIL WAR PRICES—GOVERNMENT CONTROL BLEAKISH

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16.—Last week in the grain trade was all that could have been desired from the standpoint of those who had cereals to sell.

Those who were not of a speculative mind—either buyer or seller—were able to see quite clearly that in the face of the extreme shortage of wheat throughout the world at this time, together with the fact that the winter wheat crop outlook is the smallest known for many seasons, that there could be no outcome whatever except higher prices. Unless perhaps speculative interests on the bear side were powerful enough to force declines.

It must be repeated again that wheat prices are destined to reach still higher figures if peace is declared. While I realize that this view is contrary to that entertained by many of the world's experts in the marketing game, it must be borne in mind that a very large percentage of the world has been famished for bread and breadstuffs since the war began, and that it will take some time to appease the appetite of the consumers in this regard.

The moment that peace is declared, Germany, Austria, Holland, Greece, Turkey and other nations will grab for the remaining supplies of wheat.

There is only one bearish factor in sight. If the United States government should take hold of food supplies and make an artificially powerful value. This is possible in view of the famished condition of the grade.

The scramble for coarse grains—oats and barley—during the week forced extreme high records in these cereals and the outlook is for continued strength.

Flour prices made two sensational jumps of 40 cents a barrel each during the week in the Portland market; patent ranging up to \$9.80 a barrel. The famine in hay and millstuffs continues in all coast centers and new high prices have been established.

Mr. Thompson has a member of the house of representatives in the session of 1911 and served in the senate during the sessions of 1913 and 1915 as president during the latter. Prior to that time he filled several prominent desk positions during legislative sessions. Mr. Thompson's family will come to Portland in June.

Twelve Subs. to Be Built

ASTORIA, Ore., April 16.—Twelve submarine chasers will be built by the Wilson Shipbuilding Co. It is believed, although no official announcement has been made. The company has just been incorporated and is working on organization plans now. The company was one of the three lowest bidders when the navy department recently opened bids.
