State Population Is 2,000,000 SACRAMENTO, April 19.—California's population is placed at 2,000,000 by State Controller John S. Chambers, in his annual report. Based upon the number of registered voters, he says, the population is shown to be 2,956,450; according to the system employed by the census bureau, 2,803,800; upon the school census, 3,004,000. Taking in account these various systems, Chambers declares 3,000,000 is approximately correct.
