PUTTING IN THE SEEDS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 19.—Now is the time to plant, and planting is important, for a plant is like a child—there is much in giving it a good start.

Corn should be sown at the rear of the lot. The distance between the rows can be cut down a great deal if the gardener is careful. Two feet apart will be good enough. Golden bantam corn can be used four inches apart in the rows. Sow two rows as soon as danger of frost has passed. Cover two inches deep.

A week later sow two more rows and a week later two more, making six in all. When the plants are five inches high thin to stand one foot apart in the rows. For six rows fifty feet long three pints of seed will be needed. Cultivate constantly, but as the corn grows cultivate only close to the surface. Two rows of corn fifty

feet long should produce nine dozen ears.

Smooth peas, which like rich soil, should come next. Sow these as soon as the ground is ready, but the wrinkled ones should be planted two weeks later. The peas should be placed two inches apart in the rows, which should be two feet apart for tall and eighteen inches for dwarf varieties.

Three plantings can be used in a row of beets. Early in the spring sow one-third of the row, first soaking the seed over night. Sow the seeds thin and half an inch deep. The second-third can be planted in a week and completes the row a week later. When two inches high thin out to stand four inches apart. Each fifty-foot row will take an ounce of seed.

Radishes and carrots should be sown together for two reasons. Carrots are delicate and will not push through hard ground. The radishes will take them along. Spinach will serve the same purpose. The carrots should be sown a third of a row at a time, about ten days apart, each time with radishes.

Men Who Run U. S. Navy

Admiral Robert S. Griffin

WASHINGTON, April 19.—

The United States navy was the pioneer of all the navies of the world in adopting the electric drive for battleships. Now electric propulsion is universal. A few years will see the last of the old coal driven dreadnaught.

The change is considered the most revolutionary of all modern naval development.

The man who accomplished it is Admiral Robert S. Griffin, Engineer in Chief of the United States Navy.

He is an expert of experts in anything pertaining to marine construction and is one of the veterans of the bureau he now commands.

The mechanical equipment of the great chain of radio stations which now link the United States with the Orient has been largely under the direction of Admiral Griffin. Through the trans-Pacific leap the Secretary of the Navy at his desk in Washington can communicate instantly with his commander of the Asiatic fleet, wherever it may happen to be.

The navy expects much more of Admiral Griffin's mechanical genius.

"CLEAN-UP" DATE SET BY OREGON'S GOVERNOR

APPEARANCE OF PERSONAL
PROPERTY AND OF COMMUNITIES
AS A WHOLE WILL BE
IMPROVED THEREBY

SALEM, Ore., April 19.—The first week of May will be "Oregon Clean-Up" week.

It has been designated in the following proclamation which was issued by Governor Withycombe:

Whereas, There is a widespread and commendable desire among individuals and civic organizations throughout the state that a definite period be designated in which to improve the appearance of personal property and of communities as a whole; and

Whereas, Such an organized effort has in the past proved a beneficial incentive in raising civic interest in the problems of community betterment; and

Whereas, Such cleanliness and improvement add not only to the attractions of our state, our communities and our homes, but also materially increase their healthfulness and efficiency in the conduct of the duties of everyday life.

Now, therefore, I, James Withycombe, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby proclaim the first week of May, 1917, as Oregon Clean-Up week, and during its progress I urge all citizens to devote special attention to an organized campaign whose objects shall be cleanliness, beautification and civic improvement.

Whereas, on April 2, 1917, the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls duly ordained an ORDINANCE, No. 411, which said ordinance was duly approved and filed for record April 4, 1917, proposing a grant and franchise to the Keno Power Company and which said ordinance was declared to be a competing ordinance with an initiated ordinance filed with the Police Judge March 8, 1917, and presented to the Common Council on March 12, 1917, and, whereas, the Police Judge was duly authorized and directed by the Common Council to submit such competing ordinance to the qualified voters at the general municipal election May 7, 1917, and to publish a brief statement of the tenor and effect of such competing ordinance,

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the purpose of such competing ordinance is to grant to the said Keno Power Company a franchise and right for and during a period of 35 years to erect, maintain poles, wires, cables, ducts and necessary appliances and apparatus for supplying electricity for all purposes within the limits of said city, and for the purpose of enabling and assisting the Keno Power Company to carry on its business elsewhere than in said city, as now or hereafter bounded and constituted; Said franchise ordinance provides that before beginning installation of its distributing system plans and specifications therefor shall be submitted to the Council for approval by the City Engineer. Said Keno Power Company is required under the terms of such competing ordinance to file with the Police Judge its written acceptance of its terms within sixty days from and after its approval and passage; to permit the use by the city of all its poles stringing wires for fire-alarm, police, telephone and telegraph purposes; that said Keno Power Company shall begin actual installation of its proposed system within sixty days from date of acceptance, and to afford full and adequate service to all portions of the city not later than December 1, 1919; and shall make, execute and deliver to the Police Judge for the benefit of said city an indemnity bond in the sum of \$15,000.00 conditioned that the Keno Power Company will fully comply with the provisions of such competing ordinance and franchise; the ordinance further provides that upon the acceptance of the franchise the Keno Power Company shall pay to the city the sum of \$300.00, and in addition thereto 2 1/2 per centum of its annual gross receipts derived from business within the city limits; that the city, at the expiration of the term of the franchise, may purchase and take over to itself the entire plant at a valuation to be fixed by the Public Service Commission.

It is further provided that the Keno Power Company shall not during the term of the franchise, sell, assign or transfer the same or any portion of its physical property without the consent of the Common Council.
