**NEWSPAPERMAN PRAISE
CENSOR'S WISE COUNSEL**

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 20.—
From time immemorial the news cen-
sor has been "censured" by the news-
paper man. Cases when his work has
been appreciated are so rare as to be
well worth recording.

Twenty-nine Washington news-
papermen on the State, War and Navy
"run" recently wrote a letter to Sec-
retary of War Baker in appreciation
of the services of Major Douglas Mc-
Arthur, the official war department
censor. The letter, praising the "un-
failing kindness, patience and wise
counsel" of the major, bears the auto-
graphs of the twenty-nine men.

Secretary Baker, who has found
Major McArthur invaluable as an ad-
visor and aid, expressed a wish that
the letter might be manifolded and
distributed broadcast as a proof that
real service is appreciated, though it
may come from a news censor.

**FOR THE INFORMATION OF
ELECTORS**

The confusion and inconvenience
resulting to electors applying to vote
and failing to find their names on the
registration lists, arises from the fact
that having removed to a different
ward after registering they have ne-
glected to have their registration
changed. Another source of confu-
sion results because of the fact that
the five voting wards of the city are
not coinciding with county voting
precincts, and the electors fail to get
the distinction fixed in their minds.
Electors who have changed their resi-
dence since the closing of registra-
tion a year ago in April, should ap-
ply to the Police Judge at once for
change of registration.

Briefly, the boundaries of the five
voting wards of the city are as fol-
lows:

Ward 1.—From western city limits
easterly to Center, northwesterly
along Juniper and Ewauna streets to
line between First addition and Buena
Vista addition to intersection with
Mitchell street, west to city limits.

Ward 2.—From Center to Sixth
street.

Ward 3.—From Sixth street north-
easterly to south boundary of cem-
tery and southeasterly to Commer-
cial.

Ward 4.—Includes all the city ter-
ritory east of Commercial street and
south of Main street from the White
Pelican corner to easterly city limits,
also the territory known as the Hot
Springs addition.

Ward 5.—The line dividing Ward 5
from Wards 3 and 4 extends from
intersection of Grant and Sixth streets
to Prospect; along Prospect to Up-
ham; easterly along Upham and south
boundary of cemetery to southeast
corner of cemetery; thence due north
to north boundary of Hillside addi-
tion; thence west to city limits.

**THREE-YEAR ROAD
PLAN IS MAPPED
OUT IN OREGON**

**AGREED ON BY STATE HIGHWAY
COMMISSION**

Includes Crater Lake Road From This
City to Medford—Also McKenzie
Pass Road From Eugene Over the
Mountains Towards Bend and
Vicinity and Other Forest Roads
in That Section of the State.

A three-year plan of co-operation
in the construction of forest roads
was agreed upon Tuesday by the
state highway commission and Dis-
trict Forester Cecil at Portland this
week. Before it can become effec-
tive the plan must be approved by
the secretary of agriculture.

The forest roads which have been
selected, when completed, will be
parts of the state highway system.

Under section 8 of the federal aid
act which applies to forest roads
there will be available from the fed-
eral government for the three-year
period \$382,000. This is to be
matched by the state dollar for dol-
lar, and in addition a number of
counties have agreed to contribute
\$100,000, making altogether a grand
total of \$864,000.

The work of construction is to be
under the supervision of the forest
department.

Forest sections of the following
roads were designated in the agree-
ment:

McKenzie pass road in Lane and
Deschutes counties.
Mt. Hood loop road in Hood River
and Clackamas counties.
Eugene-Florence, Lane county.
Willamette valley-Tillamook, Til-
lamook county.

Prineville-Mitchell, Crook and
Wheeler counties.

Reynolds creek section of John Day
highway in Grant county.

Pilot Rock to Prairie City via Rit-
ter, Nye and Albany, Umatilla, Mal-
heur and Grant counties.

Enterprise-Flora, Wallowa county.
La Grande to Pendleton, Union and
Umatilla counties.

Medford to Klamath Falls, Jack-
son and Klamath counties.

Reedsport-Marshfield, Coos county.
Provision is also made for a road
in Curry county from Gold Beach to
Bandon.

In the road from La Grande to
Pendleton both the Thomas Ruggles
and Meacham routes will be con-
sidered before final location.

The agreement presents a well-
balanced allotment among the differ-
ent sections of the state in which
forests are located.

The state highway commission au-
thorized the survey of a road from
Pilot Rock to Heppner in Morrow
county at the expense of the state.

In view of the fact that no funds
for hard surfacing will be available
until after the \$6,000,000 bond issue
is voted, the commission laid on the
table a communication from the coun-
ty court of Wasco county asking that
an appropriation be made out of the
first funds available for hard sur-
facing the Columbia river highway
as soon as the county shall have pre-
pared the grade.

Falls duly ordained an ORDINANCE,
No. 411, which said ordi-
nance was duly approved and filed for
record April 4, 1917, proposing a
grant and franchise to the Keno
Power Company and which said ordi-
nance was declared to be a compet-
ing ordinance with an initiated ordi-
nance filed with the Police Judge
March 8, 1917, and presented to the
Common Council on March 12, 1917,
and, whereas, the Police Judge was
duly authorized and directed by the
Common Council to submit such com-
peting ordinance to the qualified
voters at the general municipal elec-
tion May 7, 1917, and to publish a
brief statement of the tenor and ef-

is to grant to the said Keno Power
Company a franchise and right for

abling and assisting the Keno Power
Company to carry on its business else-
where than in said city, as now or
hereafter bounded and constituted:
Said franchise ordinance provides
that before beginning installation of
its distributing system plans and
specifications therefor shall be sub-
mitted to the Council for approval
by the City Engineer. Said Keno
Power Company is required under
the terms of such competing ordi-
nance to file with the Police Judge its
written acceptance of its terms within
sixty days from and after its approval
and passage; to permit the use by
the city of all its poles stringing wires
for fire-alarm, police, telephone and
telegraph purposes; that said Keno
Power Company shall begin actual
installation of its proposed system

within sixty days from date of accep-
tance, and to afford full and adequate
service to all portions of the city not
later than December 1, 1919; and
shall make, execute and deliver to
the Police Judge for the benefit of
said city an indemnity bond in the
sum of \$15,000.00 conditioned that
the Keno Power Company will fully
comply with the provisions of such
competing ordinance and franchise;
the ordinance further provides that
upon the acceptance of the franchise
the Keno Power Company shall pay
to the city the sum of \$200.00, and
in addition thereto 2 1/2 per centum
of its annual gross receipts derived
from business within the city limits;
that the city, at the expiration of the
term of the franchise, may purchase
and take over to itself the entire plant
at a valuation to be fixed by the Pub-
lic Service Commission.

It is further provided that the
Keno Power Company shall not dur-
ing the term of the franchise, sell
assign or transfer the same or any
portion of its physical property with-
out the consent of the Common Coun-
cil.
