HIGH PRICES PREVAIL

STILL IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, April 23.—Take an-

other notch in your belt—if there's

any notches left. This high cost of

living stuff is old by now, but the Pa-

cific Northwest housewife can't lose

her interest in it.

Cheese prices are up another quar-

ter of a cent a pound. Flour is ex-

pected to go even higher. The smelt

season has ended, and with it went

the last of the cheap fish.

Wheat establishes a new high re-

cord almost every day in the grain mar-

kets of the Northwest, and with wheat

up goes flour and the hundred and one

wheat products.

Livestock of every kind is at an un-

heard of figure. With potatoes and

onions, not only are the prices going

up, but it is almost impossible to se-

cure supplies.

PORTLAND DAIRYMEN

GET HIGHEST PRICES

PORTLAND, April 23.—Dairymen

are today receiving the highest price

in their history for milk, owing to the

enormous demand for the canned pro-

duct and the general milk shortage.

Within the last few days the conden-

saries advanced their buying price of

raw milk to \$2.15 per 100 pounds,

which is 50 cents higher than the ruling

price a year ago.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., April  
21.—With a record of distinguished  
military service in two wars, Private  
A. Collins has come back home. He  
is the proud possessor of the dis-  
tinguished service medal, won in the  
South African war, and of the Me-  
daille Militaire, presented to him by  
the French government for his ser-  
vice on the western front. The price  
of honor has been high, however, for  
Private Collins never again will be  
able to fight under the flag of the  
dominion. He received a wound in  
the hip, and shrapnel hit him in the  
eye.
