## NOTICE

Whereas, on April 2, 1917, the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls duly ordained an ORDINANCE, No. 411, which said ordinance was duly approved and filed for record April 4, 1917, proposing a grant and franchise to the Keno Power Company and which said ordinance was declared to be a competing ordinance with an initiated ordinance filed with the Police Judge March 8, 1917, and presented to the Common Council on March 12, 1917, and, whereas, the Police Judge was duly authorized and directed by the Common Council to submit such competing ordinance to the qualified voters at the general municipal election May 7, 1917, and to publish a brief statement of the tenor and effect of such competing ordinance,

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the purpose of such competing ordinance is to grant to the said Keno Power Company a franchise and right for and during a period of 25 years to erect, maintain poles, wires, cables, ducts and necessary appliances and apparatus for supplying electricity for all purposes within the limits of said city, and for the purpose of enabling and assisting the Keno Power Company to carry on its business elsewhere than in said city, as now or hereafter bounded and constituted: Said franchise ordinance provides that before beginning installation of its distributing system plans and specifications therefor shall be submitted to the Council for approval by the City Engineer. Said Keno Power Company is required under the terms of such competing ordinance to file with the Police Judge its written acceptance of its terms within sixty days from and after its approval and passage; to permit the use by the city of all its poles stringing wires for fire-alarm, police, telephone and telegraph purposes; that said Keno Power Company shall begin actual installation of its proposed system within sixty days from date of acceptance, and to afford full and adequate service to all portions of the city not later than December 1, 1919; and shall make, execute and deliver to the Police Judge for the benefit of said city an indemnity bond in the sum of \$15,000.00 conditioned that the Keno Power Company will fully comply with the provisions of such competing ordinance and franchise; the ordinance further provides that upon the acceptance of the franchise the Keno Power Company shall pay to the city the sum of \$200.00, and in addition thereto 2 1/2 per centum of its annual gross receipts derived from business within the city limits; that the city, at the expiration of the term of the franchise, may purchase and take over to itself the entire plant

at a valuation to be fixed by the Public Service Commission.  
It is further provided that the Keno Power Company shall not during the term of the franchise, sell, assign or transfer the same or any portion of its physical property without the consent of the Common Council.

You deserted and abandoned the above described lands on or about the 25th day of November, 1915, and ever since the said time and date have entirely and totally failed, neglected and omitted to establish a residence upon the said lands or to live thereon or to improve or to cultivate the same, and that the said lands are in a state of neglect and decay; that shortly after his entry on said lands you made a few improvements of small value, which said improvements are now in a state of neglect and decay, and that the said Fred Eakins, yourself, has since the date of said desertion remained away. That your absence from the said lands and the abandonment thereof by you, was not due to your employment in military service rendered in connection with operations in Mexico, or along the borders thereof, or in mobilization camps elsewhere, or in the military or naval organization of the United States or the national guard of any of the several states.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken as confessed, and your said entry will be canceled without further right to be heard, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically responding to these allegations of contest, together with due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail.

MATFIELD'S BROTHERS AMONG  
ELECTION BANDITS ON TRIAL

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., April 25.—Bandits armed with revolvers and with faces hidden behind black masks, swept down on the polling place in Rockhouse precinct, Mingo county, shortly before the ballots of the 1914 congressional election were counted, held up the entire election staff at the point of guns and stole the entire franchise of the precinct. Poll books, ballot boxes and election paraphernalia were carted away.

Two brothers of a former governor of this state will go to trial tomorrow in federal court here, charged with complicity in that raid. They are Greenway and Valentine Hatfield, brothers of former Governor H. G. Hatfield. Three others, Noah White, George R. Maynard and Jack Brewster—who experienced a mistrial at the September term, will face the same charges tomorrow.

One lone Bull Moose ballot, found on a wild hillside, miles from the precinct, is the only one of the 800 ballots ever found.  
Howard Sutherland, republican senator from West Virginia, and C. E. Cooper, republican, were the successful candidates in the 1914 election. The alleged fraud favored democrats, it is claimed, but did not materially affect the republican count.
