An Insight Into the Making of the Automobile

DODGE BROTHERS STARTED IN MAKING CARS OF OWN DESIGN BUT TWO YEARS AGO, AND NOW TURN OUT 400 A DAY

Dodge Brothers began making cars of their own design two years ago. At that time the plant comprised 20 acres of floor space, but since then constant additions of new buildings have provided a total of 72 acres, including buildings now under construction and nearing completion.

The company employs 13,000 men, and is producing more than 400 cars a day. Approximately 130,000 cars have been built and sold in the first 26 months. This remarkable record is due to the manufacturing efficiency brought about by the use of the very latest methods and the best equipment it is possible to obtain.

The factory is so laid out that the main assembly building, which is 1,100 feet long, 60 feet wide, four stories high, and runs from east to west, is fed with parts and units from the other buildings and wings which run from north to south.

The chassis and final assembly departments are confined to one floor, however, in the main assembly building, while the floor immediately below is occupied by storerooms. The one immediately above contains the trim and top departments, where the body is completely upholstered and the tops and curtains are manufactured complete.

On account of its recent construction, the plant embodies practically every known modern device for efficient production of automobiles in quantities. In addition to this, much original equipment in the way of conveyors and machining processes has been constructed.

The enamel is thoroughly clarified in the basement of this building and is carried to the fourth floor through a circulating system, and there applied by flooding, as stated, behind a glass screen which excludes all dust. The capacity of the present body enameling plant is 400 cars a day.

Other conveyors of equal interest are in use throughout the shop for the assembly of the motors, assembly of transmissions and rear axles, enameling and baking of frames, assembly of wheels, rims and tires, and for the chassis and final assembly.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 28.—Representatives of practically every activity in Seattle today went on record favoring a general adoption of the daylight saving plan during war time.

An industrial railway completely encircles the plant and enters every department on the ground floor. The forge plant contains more than 50 steam hammers, ranging in capacity from 400 to 7,500 pounds each, and producing 185,000 pounds of steel forging daily.

In the heat treat department from 90,000 to 100,000 parts are treated every 4 hours, and for this purpose 30 furnaces and 20 cyanide pots are required. A thousand pounds of cyanide are used each day in the latter 14,000 gallons of fuel oil are consumed each day for heating the furnaces in the forge and heat treat departments.

In the machine shops the unit system is largely in vogue by which system all machine operations necessary to complete units and parts, such as cylinders, connecting rods, pistons, transmission cases, oil pumps, water pumps, differential carriers, steering rear cases, are performed in consecutive order and travel in a straight line without leaving the department.

In the cylinder department there are massive machines which mill off the tops of 24 cylinder blocks at one setting. Even the cylinder heads are stood on edge on the same machines and they are likewise milled off at the same time.

In the screw machine department the automatic machines produce 300,000 parts every twenty-four hours, and some of the operations are so fast that the eye can hardly follow them.

Dodge Brothers operate a completely equipped service school for instructing salesmen, service employees, and a number from the factory and offices regarding the construction, care and operation of the automobile.

Such is the perfection of detail in this huge plant that two hours and thirty-five minutes from the time the bare frame starts in on the upper end of the final assembly conveyor, the car is driven off under its own power at the end of the line, thoroughly built and fully equipped.—It.
