NATIONAL BABY WEEK IS FIRST WEEK IN MAY

STARTED IN 1914 AND NOW 2100 EXHIBITIONS HELD

Friday and Saturday of This Week is Set Aside by the Women's Library Club for Baby Welfare Exhibit in the City Hall—Physicians and Nurses of Klamath Falls Will Assist During Show and Lecture.

The first week of May, 1917, has been set aside as National Baby Week. A baby week is a campaign with a two-fold purpose, viz: to give the mothers and fathers of a community to learn the most important facts concerning the care of the baby, and to bring home to the community a knowledge of the facts regarding the needless deaths of its babies and a realization of the ways in which it must protect them.

Chicago held the first baby week in 1914. The movement has spread rapidly until last year there were authentic reports of campaigns in 2100 communities. No doubt many were held from which no report was made.

The Women's Library Club has set aside Friday and Saturday, May 4th and 5th, for a baby welfare exhibit to be held in the city hall. Physicians and nurses have responded willingly to invitations to help.

It is the wish of the committee in charge to refrain from averaging scores made by the babies because the new baby show is a fight for the welfare of all babies and not a contest to determine which baby will score the highest mark on health. Formerly the baby shows were chiefly for picking out the baby which enjoyed the best health, but today this

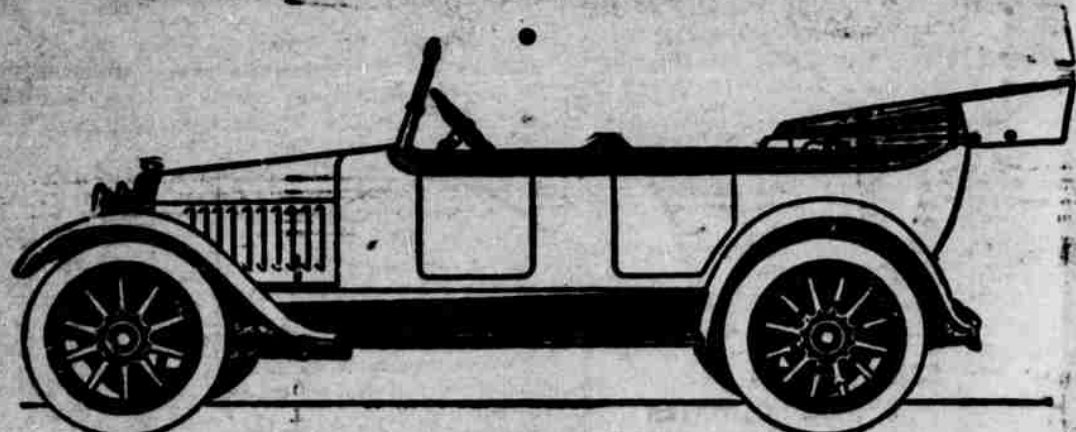
