#### BELL SUCCEEDS WOOD AS COMMANDER OF THE EAST

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Major General Leonard Wood was succeeded as commander of the East today by Major General Franklin Bell, who has been commander of the department of the West, with headquarters at San Francisco. Wood establishes the new department of the South, with headquarters at Charleston, S. C.

The transfer which roused a storm of criticism on the part of Wood's friends, who charged that the general's criticism of the war department methods was the reason for it, reverses a seven-year-old incident. In 1910 Wood succeeded Bell as chief of staff; today Bell takes the more important post, and Wood commands a new, and in popular opinion less important post.

#### RUMOR MAKES THIS STRIKE DAY IN GERMANY

LONDON, May 1.—Today is the day set by unconfirmed rumors from several neutral sources for a general strike throughout Germany. Sporadic strikes in many localities, which started with a 25 per cent cut in bread allowance, have hindered munition works for several weeks.

#### INDEBTEDNESS TO ENCOURAGE WATER TRANSPORTATION

The Herald will each day print one of the eight measures as they will appear on the state ballot for the special election to be held June 4th. The first bill on the state ballot with the respective numbers, is as follows: Submitted by the legislature— Authorizing Ports to Create Limited Indebtedness to Encourage Water Transportation—Purpose— Amending section 9 of article 11 of the constitution by providing that municipal corporations designated ports may be empowered by statute to raise money for bonuses to aid water transportation lines between such ports and other ports and to assist in establishing water transportation on interior rivers of Oregon or on rivers between Washington and Oregon or of Washington and Idaho reached by navigation from Oregon rivers. Such indebtedness shall not exceed 1 per cent of the assessed valuation of the property in the municipality, and may be incurred only by majority vote thereon. 300 Yes. 301 No.

### CHAPEL CAR ST. PETER ARRIVES

IS A COMPLETE CHURCH ON WHEELS AND IS CONSTRUCTED OF STEEL WITH A COPPER ROOF—MAHOGANY FINISH

The chapel car St. Peter, under the management of George Hennessey of Chicago, arrived Saturday evening for a two weeks' stay in the city. It is intended for mission work along railroad lines in sections of the country where Catholics are few and widely scattered.

The chapel car is a complete church on wheels and is equipped with every appointment found in a big church. Where there is no local Catholic church, services are held in the car as in a permanent church building. It is constructed of steel, has a copper roof, and is finished throughout in Cuban mahogany. The lines of architecture in the interior are strictly gothic. Being 84 feet, it is one of the largest cars made.

The part set aside for the chapel is 45 feet long and comfortably seats 75 persons. The pews are rigidly fastened to the floor and equipped with comfortable kneeling benches. The sanctuary, with its neat altar and its permanent confessional, is separated from the nave by a handsome railing. A specially constructed organ, with a rich tone, is installed near the entrance.

As there is local Catholic church here, services will not be held in the car, but visitors will be welcome to inspect it and will realize the visit will be well worth the trouble.

#### SIX DOLLARS A DAY GOAL REACHED IN CLEVELAND

CLEVELAND, May 1.—Labor has finally attained its goal in Cleveland—\$6 a day for eight hours work. Six hundred electrical workers, following a strike, signed a graduated wage scale which today gives them 75 cents an hour, or \$6 a day. Two other skilled trades have signed similar wage agreements.

### PORTLAND ADOPTS DAYLIGHT PLAN

COUNCIL APPROVES SETTING OF CLOCKS AHEAD, AS IT GIVES MORE TIME FOR WORK IN THE GARDENS

PORTLAND, May 1.—Commissioner Daly's daylight saving resolution, which calls upon the people of this city to begin work one hour earlier in the morning and quit work one hour earlier in the evening, was adopted by the unanimous vote of the Portland council. The resolution follows:

"Whereas, During the present economic crisis and period of threatened shortage of food supply, it is necessary that all available land in the city be cultivated for raising food crops for human consumption, and that all of the people should aid and participate in such cultivation, and it appearing that a more ample opportunity therefore will be afforded to those who are employed during fixed hours each day if such period of regular employment should begin one hour earlier each day, thus affording an extra hour of daylight at the close of each day for the cultivation of vacant land and gardens; therefore, be it

Resolved by the council, That all employers of labor in this city be, and they are hereby requested to cause the regular period of employment of their employes to begin and terminate one hour earlier each day."

The council will consider an ordinance this week to change the working hours of all city employes to meet the provisions of the resolution.

MEDFORD, May 1.—Dasil Gregory is being congratulated by his many friends and acquaintances over his good fortune in drawing eighty acres of choice land in the government allotment of the Tule Lake reservation in Klamath county and California, Wednesday.

The good news was received by Mr. Gregory Friday by telephone from his brother-in-law, A. C. Whitman, at Klamath Falls. The Medford man filed on the tract about a week ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Gregory will leave Medford Wednesday to live on the tract, and will at once begin to farm it. He has resigned his position at the T. E. Daniels clothing store, where he has been employed for the past seven years. Only recently Mr. Gregory was elected esquire of the Medford Lodge of Elks. He will leave this city with the best wishes of a host of friends.

His new possession is already given a value of about \$100 an acre, and consists of very rich land about six miles from Merrill, Ore. It has borne crops of barley in the past of eighty bushels to the acre. He will begin work next week of plowing and planting the tract in barley.
