EVERY FARMER
CAN DO HIS BIT

MAKING MONEY ON DESTRUCTIVE
PESTS AND LIKEWISE ASSIST-
ING COUNTRY AND WORLD IS
POSSIBLE FOR RESIDENTS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—Mak-
ing money out of destructive pests
and likewise his bit for his country, is
possible for every farm owner in the
United States.

Weeds alone cause the destruction
of several million dollars' worth of
crops every year in the United States.
In Oregon, Washington and Idaho the
losses are especially startling, owing
to the liberal rainfall in many sec-
tions which makes weeds grow faster
than the planted crop.

Making the weeds pay is a new one
to some, but others who have tried it
find it really no task at all. Not only
will the weeds be eliminated to a
great extent, but also will a long step
be taken toward solving the problem
of meat shortage. Raise sheep. That's
the answer to the problem.

The sheep supply of the world has
 dwindled at an alarming rate during
the last few years. The shortage is
more apparent in Europe than in this
country, although practically every
year recently mutton holdings in the
United States have shown a loss.

More livestock on the farms—that's
the pressing need of the country to-
day, and it is likely to make itself
more apparent during the next few
years.

In no line of livestock is there any
fear of an over-production for several
years to come, at least.

Every farmer should have a few
pigs and a few sheep to feed for mar-
ket, aside from his own home re-
quirements. Not only will it be money
in his pocket as a result of the keep-
ing of sheep and swine, but in the
case of sheep it would be better for
the crops, especially the cereal crops,
if sheep were allowed to roam over
the summer-fallow land.

TAKING MILITARY CENSUS
IN NEW YORK TODAY

ALBANY, N. Y., May 1.—Eighty-
seven questions will be asked of New
York residents between the ages of 16
and 64 in the military census, which
starts today.

The questions will include listing of
ownership of automobiles, launches,
motorcycles, cattle and other stock,
firearms, etc., and will collect a vast
amount of data for industrial mobil-
ization. Thousands of women have
volunteered for the clerical work of
the census.

INDIAN POLICY CHANGES
MADE KNOWN BY SELLS

Continued from Page 1

may, after careful investigation, be
found competent, provided, that where
deemed advisable patents in fee shall
be withheld for not to exceed forty
acres as a home.

"Indian students, when they are 21
years of age, or over, who complete
the full course of instruction in the
government schools, receive diplomas,
and have demonstrated competency,
will be so declared.

Sale of Lands

"A liberal ruling will be adopted in
the matter of passing upon applica-
tions for the sale of inherited Indian
lands where the applicants retain oth-
er lands and the proceeds are to be
used to improve the homesteads or for
other equally good purposes. A more
liberal ruling than has hitherto pre-
vailed will hereafter be followed with
regard to the applications of non-com-
petent Indians for the sale of their
lands where they are old and feeble,
and need the proceeds for their sup-
port.

Certificates of Competency
"The rules which are made to apply
in the granting of patents in fee and
the sale of lands will be made equally
applicable in the matter of issuing
certificates of competency.

Individual Indian Monies
"Indians will be given unrestricted
control of all their individual monies
upon issuance of patents in fee or cer-
tificates of competency. Strict limi-
tations will not be placed upon the
use of funds of the old, the indigent
and the invalid.

Pro Rata Shares—Trust Funds

"As speedily as possible their pro-
rata shares in tribal trust or other
funds shall be paid to all Indians who
have been declared competent, unless
the legal status of such funds pre-
vents. Where practicable the pro-
rata shares of incompetent Indians
will be withdrawn from the treasury
and placed in banks to their individual
credit.

Elimination of Ineligible Pupils From

The Government Indian Schools
"In many of our boarding schools
Indian children are being educated at
government expense whose parents
are amply able to pay for their educa-
tion, and have public school facilities
at or near their homes. Such children
shall not hereafter be enrolled in gov-
ernment Indian schools supported by
gratuity appropriations, except on pay-
ment of actual per capita cost and
transportation.

"These rules are hereby made effec-
tive, and all Indian bureau adminis-
trative officers at Washington and in the
field will be governed accordingly.

"This is a new and far reaching de-
claration of policy. It means the dawn
of a new era in Indian administration.
It means that the competent Indian
will no longer be treated as half ward
and half citizen. It means reduced
appropriations by the government, and
more self respect and independence for
the Indian. It means the ultimate
absorption of the Indian race into the
body politic of the nation. It means,
in short, the beginning of the end of
the Indian problem.

"In carrying out this policy, I cher-
ish the hope that all real friends of
the Indian race will lend their aid and
heartly co-operation."

Steel Wage Increase
STEELETON, Pa., May 1.—Ten per
cent wage increase in Bethlehem Steel
company plants here, at Sparrow's
Point and at Lebanon are effective to-
day. They affect several thousand
munition workers.
