AMERICA MUST

BUILD VESSELS

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Lord Percy of the British war commission told the American government today that "Germany is sinking ships faster than the allies are building them. The situation is appalling," he said.

He declared that it is necessary for America and the other allies to immediately concentrate on shipbuilding. He said that England can supply herself, but America must provide ships for the other countries.

His statement concerning the shipping is the overshadowing question before the war conference.



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CAMP THANKS KLAMATH PEOPLE

RECEIVES LETTER FROM CHIEF OF CONSTRUCTION CONCERNING CHARGES—SAYS MR. BOND WILL GIVE SQUARE DEAL.

"PROVO, Utah, April 26.—My Dear Mr. Camp:

"I have your letter of April 19th, in which you advise that some people from the Klamath project seem to believe that the change in project management for the Klamath project was made because of some action that you may have or may not have taken in connection with having the lower Klamath marsh lands opened for homesteads instead of being sold as state lands, and that some of them also believe that your recommendations in connection with the so-called California-Oregon Power company contract may have influenced the

"This belief is entirely unfounded, since the change was made because you have been disinclined to follow the regulations of the reclamation service or fully co-operate with the legal department in the service.—F. E. Weymouth, Chief of Construction."

The above letter is in answer to my request for an investigation of the reasons for my dismissal as project manager.

Any organization or individual has a perfect right to dismiss an employee who does not do his work as his superior officers desire it to be done.

I cannot manage this project as I think it should be managed and comply with all the red tape regulations of the reclamation service; hence I am willing to turn it over to some one else.

But I wanted the assurance that my superior officers did not consider that I had done anything dishonorable. This letter clears that up, and I am content to return to my private business, which I left at the request of

the secretary of the interior to take charge of this project.

I wish to thank the settlers and the business men who assisted me in securing this letter of vindication.

I desire to bespeak for my successor, Mr. Bond, the same hearty co-operation from the settlers which they have given me. I have known him for a number of years, and can assure every one that he will give them a square deal. He believes in co-operation and man-to-man dealing.

In bidding good-bye to the people of the project I wish to thank them for the manner in which they have worked with me for three and one-half years, and assure them that I will always have a pleasant remembrance of them and the work here. J. G. CAMP.
