 regard to religion or the Catholic

 ly from those who are honestly op-
 posed to us.
 Perhaps the people of Klamath Falls
 have often heard the Catholic church
 described as an enemy to liberty, pro-
 gress and good morals. At any rate,
 garbled versions of history, "bogus
 or ex-priests," scurrilous books and
 papers, have poisoned with prejudice
 and misunderstanding, the minds of
 many otherwise well-intentioned peo-
 ple. Should they not then show that
 broad, liberal American spirit that is
 always ready to hear the other side of
 the question, by coming to these lec-
 tures? No money will be asked; no
 collections taken up.
 Those who love the Catholic religion
 should attend and hear the founda-
 tions of the ancient faith reviewed
 and vindicated. Those who HATE the
 Catholic religion should attend, to find
 out whether or not their aversion is
 well founded. PATRIOTISM requires
 us to eliminate sectional, racial and
 religious enemies; CHARITY re-
 quires us to love others and not hate
 them; JUSTICE forbids us to falsify
 or misjudge even one of our fellow
 citizens, much less millions of them.
 IN A SPIRIT OF FAIRNESS AND
 KINDNESS, THESE SHOULD COME
 AND FIND OUT FOR THEMSELVES.
 Those who are INDIFFERENT
 about the Catholic religion (do not
 care, one way or the other) should at-
 tend. Do they not wish to be well in-
 formed upon every question of far
 reaching importance? But the Cath-
 olic church commends itself to the
 study of every intelligent and knowl-
 edge seeking mind.
 ALL, regardless of creed, should at-
 tend these lectures. All are most wel-
 come; all will be treated politely, char-

**UNIFORM TAX CLASSI-
 CATION AMENDMENT**

The Herald will each day print
 one of the eight measures as they
 will appear on the state ballot for
 the special election to be held
 June 4th.
 The fifth bill on the state
 ballot, with the respective num-
 bers, is as follows:
 Submitted by the legislative as-
 sembly—Uniform Tax Classifica-
 tion Amendment—Purpose—Amend-
 ing section 32 of article I and
 section 1 article IX of the consti-
 tution by providing for uniform
 taxation of all property of the
 same class within the state, coun-
 ty or district levying the tax, and
 classification of property for such
 purpose; for the adoption by law
 of uniform rules for assessment
 and taxation, and that all taxes
 shall be levied and collected un-
 der general laws operating uni-
 formly throughout the state, and
 omitting the present requirement
 of equality without classification.
