cure the services of such assistants,
not less than five, as he may require.

Services to Be Voluntary

"At services will be performed with-
out compensation. It is believed that
in view of the present national crisis,
when the integrity and safety of the
nation is at stake, no objection will be
entered by any American citizen to
performing this service in the coun-
try's interest without pay.

"All concerned should be advised
that there is no time to be lost and
that immediate and energetic action on
their part is expected and required.

"Acknowledgment of receipt of this
communication, together with a state-
ment of the action taken by you, is de-
sired within twenty-four hours."

Quarters Are to Be Needed

A second letter addressed to the
sheriff directs him to proceed at once
to obtain suitable premises in their
counties for the taking of the war
census.

"It is requested," reads the letter,
"that you proceed immediately to se-
cure in all precincts of Klamath coun-
ty a proper place for the taking of the
war census. It is believed that, to
avoid confusion, the precinct voting
place is best adapted to this purpose.

"Property owners and others should
donate the use of their premises one
day without expectation of remunera-
tion.

"It is urged that this work be com-
pleted without delay, and these head-
quarters notified, in detail, within for-
ty-eight hours of the action taken."

Though word has not yet been re-
ceived from Washington relative to

many details of the census, General
White intends to complete its taking
in one day, if possible. It may develop,
however, that the war department
would prefer to have it extend over
two days, in which event its wishes
would govern.

Oregon to Be Ready

As yet the age limits for those re-
quired to register have not been set-
tled by congress. After this is done
and the conscription bill made law,
the president will issue his proclama-
tion setting aside a day or days for
taking the census. Though at least a
week will be given after the procla-
mation to make ready for the census,
General White desires to have all de-
tails ready in Oregon, so the census
could be taken immediately, if neces-
sary.

The cards for registering men of mil-
itary age have already arrived in Por-
tland. Here are the questions to which
those registering must give detailed
answers:

Name in full.
Age in years.
Home address.
Date of birth.
Are you (1) a natural born citizen,
(2) a naturalized citizen, (3) an alien,
(4) or have you declared your inten-
tion (specify which).
Where were you born (town, state
and nation).
If not a citizen, of, of what country
are you a subject?
What is your present trade, occupa-
tion or office?
By whom employed?
Where employed?

Have you a father, mother, wife,
child under 12, or a sister or brother
under 12, solely dependent on you for
support (specify which)?
Married or single (which)?
Race (specify which)?
What military service have you had?
Rank, branch, years, nation or state.
Do you claim exemption from draft
(specify grounds)?
