KLAMATH WALKS AWAY WITH GAME

B. P. O. ELKS GO DOWN TO IGNOMINIOUS DEFEAT, WITH FLAG FLYING, FOR THE GOOD OF THE CAUSE AND REGULAR PRACTICE

Klamath Falls trounced the B. P. O. Elks baseball team by a score of 12 to 0 yesterday at Modoc Park, without half trying, but nevertheless it was a good practice game for the Klamath aggregation, which appeared with its infield intact for the first time this season.

With the arrival of Manager Watt, "Chick" Downey and Joe Mahar Saturday night and their appearance Sunday, the infield is complete for the season. Bowden is at his old station at third, "Chick" is stationed at first, Joe at short and Smith on second. Shadler worked in the box and Jimmie Clark behind the bat, and though the day was unfavorable and the players new to each other, the prospects look good.

Maher is built something like ex-Captain Hoag, who played his position two years ago and engineered a season of ball that could not be beaten. He is a clean-looking player, and handles himself nicely. Out of five times at bat yesterday, his first introduction to the local diamond, he secured three hits and scored two runs.

"Chick" Downey on first looks like a leaguer, and has a smooth-working action all his own around the initial sack that from first appearance holds lots of ability, speed, decision and force. He secured two hits out of four times at bat, and made three runs.

Smith, at second, has already been named "Dutch" by the fans, because of his stocky build, displayed plenty of speed and good work for the warming up game of the season yesterday. He hit once safely, and made three runs. Bowden's ability at third has been known to Klamath Falls for two years here, and seems fully capable of coming up to his old time form, with plenty of fight and life. Jimmie Clarke is well known behind the bat, and is working well with Shadler, who so far has apparently not let himself out. He used his spitter a few times yesterday, and had a good workout, taking it easy with his arm, which is a good omen at this time of the year.

Three bingles were registered off Shadler by Loewe, Jester and Bill Houston. Lowe also participated in a double play unassisted, but let a runner come home on the play. Foster worked well in the box for the first four innings, when Dale took up the cudgel. Glasier stepped in behind the bat for the first time in four years, and worked like a veteran. It was a good practice game, and gave the fans an inkling of what is coming later.

FIVE-CENT LOAF NOT IN PORTLAND

NORTHERN CITY BAKERS MAKE BUT TEN AND FIFTEEN CENT LOAVES, AND EXPLAIN RISE BY INCREASED MATERIAL COST

PORTLAND, May 7.—The five-cent loaf of bread is a novelty here today. A majority of Portland bakeries today began putting out only ten and 15 cent loaves. The 10 cent size weighs 18 ounces and the 15 cent size 24 ounces. Rolls, which sold last week at 10 cents a dozen, were advanced to 15 cents.

In explaining the increase in the price of bread, one prominent local baker said today that all raw materials have made a general advance of 82 per cent in the last few months. "Lard has gone up nine times in forty-five days," he said. "Other oil for shortening has gone up 80 per cent. Milk powder and condensed milk have doubled in price, and everybody knows the steady advances in the price of flour."
