Here's How to Fly "Old Glory"
WASHINGTON, May 8.—For
the guidance of puzzled patriots,
the war department has prescrib-
ed this simple formula for hang-
ing the American flag—as it
should be hung:
• Wherever possible, hang the
flag from a staff, and not against
the wall—use bunting for the
wall. If, however, a flag is hung
against a wall, the field of stars
should be always to the north on
a north and south street, and to
the east on an east and west
street.
• Never hang it horizontally if
possible to hang it otherwise, but
if hung horizontally, the end con-
taining the stars should be to the
north or east.
• Army regulations call for the
flag to fly from sunrise to sunset,
but it is optional with the individ-
ual whether it shall fly by night.

COLUMBIA RIVER
FISHERMEN BUSY

ASTORIA, May 8.—With the highest
prices ever paid for fish, 2,000 fisher-
men are covering the lower Columbia
river in what promises to be the great-
est season ever known here.

In what is said to be an attempt to
freeze out the smaller cannerymen
along the river, the big packers have
adopted a price of 10 cents a pound
for ordinary salmon, with a bonus for
larger fish.

Catches up to today since the season
started, May 1st, have been unusually
good.

EAST IS NOT ALONE, AS ORDERS
ARE GIVEN AT NORTHWEST
TERMINALS TO HIRE WOMEN
WHENEVER MEN QUIT

TACOMA, Wash., May 8.—Big East-
ern railroads are not alone in putting
women in jobs left by railroad men
who have enlisted. An order by Su-
perintendent J. J. McCulloch of the
Seattle, Tacoma & Auburn terminals
in effect here today instructs all de-
partments here to employ women
"whenever a man quits."

The women are given clerking jobs,
as well as yard jobs, checking jobs, en-
gine wiping jobs, engine callers, etc.,
and work under the same conditions as
men. The same order has been issued
by district superintendents of the
Northern Pacific all over the entire
system.

EXPLOSIVE POWDER IS
FOUND NEAR BEND

BEND, May 8.—A simple explosive
powder made from charcoal and a so-
lution of nitrate rock found near the
Lake-Harney county boundary, is on
display here today. The rock was
found by J. H. Morton and L. M.
Dunn of Riley, and P. H. Atkinson of
Burns.

They say that the nitrate deposit
covers approximately 3,000 acres. Mor-
ton and Dunn intend to locate the en-
tire tract as preliminary to organiza-
tion and exploitation.
