WIDDOWS GOES TO FEDERAL BANK

FISCAL AGENT OF GOVERNMENT
HERE IS APPOINTED APPRAISER
OF FEDERAL LAND BANK, WITH
HEADQUARTERS AT SPOKANE

Curtis E. Widdows, fiscal agent of the United States reclamation service in this city, received a telegram today notifying him of his appointment as appraiser of the Federal land bank at Spokane.

Mr. Widdows will make his headquarters at the bank. This bank is one of the twelve federal banks in the country. He will report there June 1st.

GIFFORD PINCHOT SAYS TO PREPARE

FOLLOWING LETTER RECEIVED
FROM THE FORMER FORESTER
BRINGS OUT NECESSITY OF
MAKING PREPARATIONS

Gifford Pinchot, formerly prominent in the nation's public affairs and man of public office, has sent out the following letter on preparedness:

"In this great time, when every citizen must do his part, the president has made his chief appeal to the men who live on the land. He is right in doing so, for the safety of our country just now is in the hands of our farmers. What I mean is not merely our safety and the safety of our allies in the matter of food. I mean that the safety of the United States against foreign invasion hangs on the decision of the farmers of the forty-eight states.

"The two great weapons in this war are arms and starvation. The war against German arms will be won or lost in France—the war against starvation will be won or lost in America. The Kaiser cannot whip the French and English armies and the British navy while England has food. But it is still possible that the German submarines may be able to keep food enough from reaching England to starve her into submission.

"If the submarines win, the first item in the Kaiser's terms of peace will be the English fleet. With the English fleet in his possession, the Kaiser will be master of the world.

"What will happen to us then? Every man who stops to think knows the answer. We shall have money, food, labor, land—everything that is desirable in the world except the power to protect what we have. Experts estimate that it will take us nine months to get ready to meet a German army of even 150,000 men, with modern artillery. Under such circumstances, would the Germans treat us better than they have already treated Belgium and France?

"Even if the armies of our allies should crush the German military power this summer, before the shortage of food can reach the point of want the world would still need vast quantities of American food. But if they do not, only one course can make us safe, and that is to grow food enough on our farms for ourselves and our allies, and to put ships enough on the sea to carry the food, in spite of the submarines, to the men who are fighting our fight.

"If the war lasts beyond this summer, it will be the American farmer who will win or lose the war, who will overcome militarism and autocracy, or allow them to spread and control the world, ourselves included.

"This is no fanciful picture, but sober fact. Many a man will make light of it until he comes to think it over, but I venture to say that few will treat it lightly after careful thought. It is no more impossible than the great war itself appeared to be, only a few days before it began.

"It is true that we can greatly increase the available food supply out of grain now used in making liquors and by reducing household waste. But when these two things are done, and done thoroughly, they will not be enough. The final decision will still rest in the hands of the men who raise our food in the first place.

The clear duty of the nation is to guarantee the farmers a fair price for their crops when grown, and a reasonable supply of labor at harvest. The clear duty of the farmer is to raise food enough to win this war for democracy against kaiserism.

No such responsibility has ever rested on any class of men since the world began as rests today on the farmers of America."

BRITISH AND GERMANS LOCKED

First American Officer to Lose His Life in the War With Germany

This is believed to be a picture of Lieutenant Clarence C. Thomas, of Grass Valley, Calif., formerly of the battleship Florida, who as commander of the naval gun crew on the oil tanker Vacuum lost his life when the German submarine torpedoed the vessel.

With nine men of his crew he left the ship in a small boat which was not again reported. Lieutenant Thomas is the first American naval or military officer to lose his life in the war with Germany.

IN COMPANY WITH 150 OTHERS,
SIX BOYS FROM THIS CITY WILL
LEAVE PORTLAND TO JOIN AVI-
ATION CORPS IN TEXAS

In response to a telegram received Sunday from Lou Hoagland, Mrs. Nate Otterbein and Mrs. Cora Sanderson left for Ashland on the auto stage this morning to intercept the train carrying six Klamath youths to Texas to join the aviation corps at Fort Sam Houston.

According to a letter received from Hoagland which was started at about the same time as the telegram, about 150 boys who have signed up for the aviation corps would be started from Vancouver barracks today. Among the boys thus assigned are Ray Peters, Joe Skelton, Bill Weeks, Everett McCullum, Pat Sanderson and Lou Hoagland.

Information regarding the train on which they would ride was rather vague, and the mothers of Sanderson and Hoagland resolved to take no chances. They will be in Ashland in time to meet every train leaving Portland today. When the train on which their boys are riding arrives, the mothers will take passage, and accompany the boys as far as Weed.

Friends of the lads are today preparing a box of "good eats," which will be sent to Weed, and be delivered to them as they pass through.

ELECTION IS LANDSLIDE FOR THREE NEW MEN

possible," was the one sentiment expressed at the mass meeting held at the opera house Saturday night before the election, and the vote yesterday upheld that sentiment nearly four to one.

The voting yesterday was slow during the forenoon, but during the afternoon and evening ran much heavier. The polls closed at 8 o'clock, and by 9 o'clock the returns commenced coming in. All were in by 10 o'clock except for the Third ward, where the heaviest vote was cast. The election boards displayed dispatch and rapidity in their work, and 11 o'clock saw the work practically cleaned up.

The new councilmen take office on the first Monday in June.

On the Keno franchise bill the vote of the people was decidedly in favor of the franchise offered on the initiative petition and prepared by the public service commission of Oregon. The initiative franchise carried in every ward but the Fifth, where both carried a favorable vote.

The total vote for the initiative measure was 583 and against the competing franchise, 578. This measure was presented through the council. But 131 votes were cast against the initiative measure, 578 against the other, with 553 for this measure.

Two ineffectual attempts by the California-Oregon Power company to secure an injunction against placing the two franchises on the ballot. Both requests for injunction were turned down, once by the circuit court here and by Judge Wolverton in the United States Federal court in Portland. Both decisions were given down on practically the same grounds, that the points brought up by the power company's attorneys need not interfere with the election, and can be fought afterwards if it is desired.
