Not Affected by War

RIO DE JANEIRO, April 15.—(By
mail)—Brazil's meat market has not
yet been stamped by the high cost of
living—doubtless because there are
about twice as many cattle in the coun-
try as people. The last bovine census
placed the figures at 50,000,000 head.

Despite the advice of health author-
ities who prescribe a light meat diet
during hot weather, Brazilians eat ap-
proximately their own weight in flesh,
fish and fowl annually. And hot
weather is Brazil's eternal portion.

To feed the aggregate stomach of

Rio de Janeiro during 1916 it required
105,000,000 pounds of beef, 2,500,000
pounds of veal, 5,700,000 pounds of
pork and 400,000 pounds of mutton, to
say nothing of a daily portion of about
sixty tons of fish and equal weight of
dried beef, 30,000 pounds of poultry
and a liberal amount of goat flesh and
wild game.

Brazilians probably are great meat
eaters because, relatively, meat is the
cheapest thing to eat. Prices fluctu-
ated in 1916 between 7 and 12 cents a
pound for beef, 7 and 15 cents for veal
and 15 and 23 cents for pork.

Good Roads for Oregon

The Herald will run daily "the clearest, most readable and most in-

below has been termed, written by E. J. Adams of Eugene, and state
highway commissioner. "A simple explanation of the \$6,000,000 bond-
ing act—questions answered—replies to objections—statistics analy-
zed"—says C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter. "The measure
discussed in its relation to existing road legislation and the whole road
situation as it faces the people of Oregon, at the special election,
June 4, 1917.

"There is nothing that can be done
in Oregon today of such vital impor-
tance in the growth and development
of the state as the intelligent construc-
tion of good roads to meet present day
traffic conditions. It is true that O-
regon, as all other states, has been open-
ed up by railroads to a great extent,
but with the coming of the auto truck
and automobiles, the highways of the
state become of even greater impor-
tance than the railroads.

"We have been building roads in
Oregon for upwards of sixty years.
First the footpath over which the early
pioneer packed upon his back provi-
sions for himself and family; then a
better trail, over which he used the
pack mule or pack horse; then came
the primitive wagon roads, which were
by degrees improved until we learned
the necessity of drainage, which is of
importance in the construction of any
road, whatever be its type.

"Since then we have been able to
construct a great many miles of good
gravel and macadam road, which
would be as good a type of road as we
would ever need for the steel-tired,
horse-drawn vehicle, but within the
last ten years the automobile has very
largely taken the place on the horse
upon the road, and we are just now en-
tering, to a greater degree than ever
before, upon the use of auto trucks in
place of the draft horse.

AUTO A VACUUM CLEANER
"With this condition prevailing, and
bearing in mind that 80 per cent of all
the traffic of the state is carried over
20 per cent of the road, we must face
the problem of building roads that will
resist the wear and tear of the motor
vehicle.

"The macadam road and the gravel
road does not meet this demand for
the very simple reason that every

wheel of the automobile is a vacuum
cleaner, pulling the dry binder out of
the road where it is transferred to the
ditches and fields alongside, and the
road material unravels, ruts and be-
comes filled with potholes.

"The cost of maintaining this type
of a road under heavy traffic varies
from \$150 to \$900 per mile, and even
at that the road is more than half the
time in very bad condition. Upon our
main roads we must, therefore, put a
hard surface that the pneumatic tire

cannot loosen, and underneath this
Present Maintenance Cost
\$150 to \$900 per mile

hard surface, whatever it may be, we
must provide a base of gravel, stone,
crushed rock or concrete of sufficient
weight to bear the heavy loads that
will pass over it.

EXPLAINS FEDERAL AID
"The federal government, under the
terms of the Shuckeloff bill, has pro-
posed to aid the various states in the
construction of post and forest roads.

DEFINES "POST ROAD"
"The post roads are to be built by
the state highway department, accord-
ing to specifications provided by the
federal highway department. Any road
that now carries the United States
mail or that may hereafter carry it, it
defined in the bill as a post road.

AND "FOREST ROAD"
"The forest roads must be built
wholly within, or partly within and
partly without, national forests. These
roads are built by the federal highway
department, and the only part the state
has to agree upon the projects, and
amount to be expended and contribute
its portion of the cost."
