America's Weight Needed in War

ple felt themselves exerting their full strength did they realize how wisely he spoke.

"May America's realization not be so long delayed. Kitchener's message comes to Americans afoak. I hope they get that message."

It was late in the evening Thursday that I first talked with Lord Derby. The room was slowly darkening. The war secretary, as he spoke these last words, paused and smoked furiously. His face and form were half hidden.

In the haze of tobacco smoke and dusk of the room, it was easy for the imagination to conjure up the piercing grey eyes of the silent "man who knew"—Kitchener—who, sitting at the same desk, fought and defeated British apathy when that effort seemed hopeless.

"Americans are quicker at some things than the British," Lord Derby resumed, after a moment. "I believe America will get a quicker start than we did—if her people appreciate the size of the job."

"Can the American army be trained as rapidly as the new units of the British army—that is, in three months?" was asked.

"There again American quickness will probably show itself," the war secretary returned. "The fact that the British are now able to train men in three months is partly due to their dealing with seasoned organizations from the front."

"But I should say that three months' training in America, plus a certain amount of necessary training in France, would make the fittest kind of soldiers from entirely raw material."

"The matter of getting a small American contingent over here even earlier is one which American soldiers must decide for themselves, but I have no doubt of the effect it would have on the British. The French are less stolid and it would affect them even greater."

"What about Americans on the Russian front?" Lord Derby was asked. "That is entirely a matter for soldiers to decide. It certainly could not fail to inspire the Russian people."

"There's another phase of this question of moral effect about which little has been said—and that is the effect on the German people when America actually takes the field. Think what it means. Many Germans have looked to America as a sort of heaven. Many have been struggling for years in the hope of emigrating there. Now it will seem that the gates are closed. This effect on the German people may possibly be the most important single proof that they are the worst victims of the system for which they are being slaughtered to defend."

"No one can question the tremendous effect of the first appearance of an American army—however small—in the fighting line."

"But after all, that's not the main thing. That won't end the war."

"Not until America begins making war as though she alone faced Germany will there be a possibility of predicting when the end will come—and I know that is the spirit in which the American nation is taking up the conflict."

HORSE MEAT IS INTRODUCED NOW

WARM SPRING INDIANS SELL HORSES TO PORTLAND MAN FOR RESTAURANT. INSPECTOR PROVIDED.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21—Toothsome T-bones for seven and one-half cents, and the nicest cuts of meat for five cents. Think of it, you victims of the H. C. of L.

Not beef, of course, but tender horse meat from the plains of eastern Oregon are offered here at these prices. The Eastern Oregon Horse Meat Market, Edward Kanser, proprietor, opened here this morning and reports business fine. He sells horse meat from four to seven and one-half cents a pound.

The horses were rounded up by Warm Springs Indians on their reservation east of the mountains and were shipped to the Portland Union Stock Yards the latter part of last week. The horses were wild, and too small for use on farms or by the government.

Kanser is said to have the only exclusive horse meat market in the west. Because of the introduction of horse meat on the market here, the city now has an ordinance providing for the inspection of horse meat by the municipal meat inspector.
