THREE RAILROADS
HELP WAR FUND

LINES RUNNING INTO PORTLAND
HAVE STANDING OFFER TO AD-
VANCE MONEY TO EMPLOYEES
TO BUY WAR BONDS.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22—To en-
courage employees to buy war bonds,
the Union Pacific, the Oregon Short
Line, the Oregon-Washington Railroad
and Navigation Company and all sus-
sidiary corporations to day have stand-
ing offer to advance money to em-
ployees for the purchase of war bonds,
according to a statement made public
by J. D. Farrell, president of the Ore-
gon-Washington company.

"I trust that every man and woman
in our organization intends as a pa-
triotic duty to subscribe to the 3 1/2 per
cent Liberty Loan bond about to be
issued by the Government to carry
on the war." The statement reads:
"The loan must be made a conspicuous
success to enable every employee to
participate in this patriotic purpose
the company will upon the request
of any such employee make subscrip-
tion for his or her account to any
amount of bonds not exceeding 25 per
cent of the employee's yearly salary
and will advance the whole subscrip-
tion price, charging interest at the
rate of 3 1/2 per cent per annum, being
the same rate as borne by the bond."

The Union Pacific system has sub-
scribed for \$5,000,000 of the Liberty
Loan bond issue. Thousands of em-
ployees in the three northwestern
states alone can take advantage of
this offer.

MAY SEEDING IMPORTANT

Plant Early String Beans, Radishes,
Carrots, Lettuce and Peas.

The abundance of the season's gar-
den crops will depend very largely upon
the start the plants get during May.

Refugee or 1000-1 and Stringless
Greenpod are good varieties of early
string beans and should be planted at
once. Early sowing of beet and carrot
seed should be planted the first week
in May and the young plants should
be thinned before they become crowd-
ed in the row. In the early carrot and
parsnip rows, some radish seeds should
be dropped to help break the soil
crust and show the rows. Radishes
should be sown at regular intervals in
order to keep the table supplied. This
is also true of head lettuce, the pre-
ferred varieties of which are Hanson
or leburg, and they should have an
abundance of room in which to mature
large crisp heads.

Peas should be sown immediately
for the main crop but no more spinach
should be planted. The beet thinnings
will make good greens later on and
the gardener can depend for his sup-
ply of greens upon Swiss Chard which
is not so susceptible to hot weather.
Kohlrabi makes a good summer root
crop.

Squashes, cucumbers, melons, lima
beans, etc., should be planted about
the middle of the month and with the
exception of beans will do better if
the individual hills are fertilized with
manure before planting. Marshall's

or Oregon pole beans are a very de-
sirable variety.

Tomato plants should be grown
nicely toward the latter part of the
month and by training them up to
two or three stems the fruit can be
held off the ground and the plants
set closer together in the rows. Pe-
pper and eggplant plants should not be
field set this month unless the weather
becomes warm and settled.

For winter garden, late cabbage,
cauliflower, broccoli, Scotch Kale and
Brussels Sprouts should be sown
about the 20th of May as the plants
may go into the field about the first
of July.

A second planting of sweet corn, if
made at the end of the month, will
give a fresh supply after the early
corn has been bearing for some time.
Early varieties such as the Golden
Bantam may be seeded again.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22—Stuart
O. Blythe, for the last four years the
member of the editorial staff of a
Portland daily, today took up his new
duties as an employee of the Com-
mittee of Public Information, recently
created by President Wilson for the
dissemination of the official news of
the United States. Blythe left Port-
land last Thursday night. He met his
father, Samuel G. Blythe, noted writer
on politics and national issues at
Green River, Wyo., and the two com-
pleted the transcontinental trip to-
gether.

CANADIANS TO
GET GERMAN GUNS

NEW WESTMINSTER TO GET ONE
OF CAPTURED MACHINE GUNS
FROM GREAT OFFENSIVE MOVE-
MENT IN FRANCE.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., May
22—New Westminster is going to have
a German machine gun, captured by
Canadians on the battle line in France.
Another gun may be sent to Van-
couver.

Lieutenant Art Mills, a New West-
minster man, wrote the mayor of
the town declaring the intention of
his company to distribute German
guns.

"I suppose you have been reading
about the big German advance," Lieut-
enant Mills wrote. "We were in it. My
company got five German machine
guns. We were out five days al-
together, in mud up to our waists at
times, but casualties were light con-
sidering our operations. We attacked
one of the strongest points on the
western front and expect it will go
down in history as one of the greatest
battles. It is great to feel that one
has come through something so big
without a scratch. The last day,
when we had them on the run across
the open, was worth all the four
months we spent on this spot. It was
great. Our artillery did great work.
The ground was simply littered
with German dead. We found some
wonderful German dugouts, forty feet
underground with furniture in them—
benches, stoves, cases of wine, cigars,
cigarettes and food—in fact, we made
some wonderful discoveries."
