

Thirty War Census Marshals or Registrars have been appointed by resentatives and the foremost advo-cate of prepardness there, has re-signed his place to fight. He sent to the registration of all men between the ages of 21 and 30, inclusive, under

In all instances, practically, the special marshals will be at the regular voting precincts on this day for this work except where special arrange ments have been made as at Odessa for one of the lumber companies.

Arrangements have been comple with this company so that as little loss of time from work as possible may result.

There are ten marshals or registrars for this city and twenty in the county. Their duty is to register all men tween the prescribed ages without exception. The registrars have as registration clerks so far as the making of exceptions can be made, and it is their duty, as well as that of all other citizens, to report and aid the sheriff and his deputies in any cases where persons are not complying with this law. The penalty for not registering on this date is imprisonment, with no alternative. Special arrangements have been made for sick persons or those who expect to be absent from their home county on June 5.


