CHILD LABOR LAW SHOULD REMAIN

CHILDREN SHOULD NOT BE RELEASED FOR WORK UNTIL IT IS SHOWN TO BE ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY.

NEW YORK, May 23—Repeal of the national child labor law so that children could replace men called for war would be as great a crime as any committed during the conflict, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, national president of the National Woman Suffrage Association, declares in a statement to the United Press. Headquarters of the suffrage association here issued the statement for Mrs. Catt, after having been informed that suspension of the law for war purposes was contemplated by some congressmen.

"There has been no crime committed greater than would be the repeal of the national child labor law," Mrs. Catt said.

"It required a generation of time and effort to secure it and its repeal would mean the sacrifice of another generation—the children whom the enemies of that law are lying in wait to exploit. After we have passed through such a three-year struggle as has destroyed the manhood of Europe, it will be time enough to talk of crowding the children into the ranks of labor, made vacant by the demands of military service.

"Let them be filled by men too old for war, but able to do any work that may be required of them. In addition to these men is the great reserve force of women waiting to be called on. Not until the last one of these two classes has been utilized let employers of labor dare lay hands on the children of the nation."

The National League of Women Workers joined in the protest against the contemplated suspension of the law, declaring its "willingness to cooperate against any effort to break down labor restrictions guarding the children."

CHICAGO, May 23—"It is a very great shame even to consider setting aside the federal child labor law during the war—especially as there is no present emergency," is the statement of Miss Mary McDowell, resident head of the Chicago University Settlement "back of the yards."

"England rushed into a similar situation at the beginning of the war and now is regretting it. The juvenile delinquency in that country has increased 25 per cent as a result of taking children from school and putting them to work.

Good Roads for Oregon

APPEAL TO PREJUDICE

(n) Our friends again appeal to the prejudices of the voter by saying "this is a paving scheme, conceived in the subtle brain of some paving companies," and then conjure with the name of Rockefeller, saying "Rockefeller's vaults are bursting with money that he wants to loan on bonds at 4 per cent. Why not? He would get the interest, supply the asphalt, sell the automobiles, furnish rubber for tires, and sell the gasoline and oil. What more could he wish?"

Can you conceive of intelligent men appealing to the prejudices of the people of this State in such a manner to defeat a purely economic proposition, for such an important thing as the construction of good roads that every one may have the use of?

It is perfectly true that this is a paving scheme. It is a plan to hard surface our most important and heaviest traveled country roads because that is the only economic way of preparing these roads to meet the modern day conditions of travel. Where this bill was conceived, I do not know. If our friends know what they say to be a fact, it must be because they are very close to these paving interests and share the confidence of these people.

APPEAL TO REASON

Whether it was borne in the subtle mind of paving concerns or not has no bearing whatsoever upon the question now before us. We are considering this bill according to the terms in which it is now written since the Legislature made various amendments to it. If the terms of this bill are good and for the best interests of the State, then we want it, and if they are not good, we do not want it, regardless of where it came from.

Let us be fair with each other and appeal to the reason and good judgment of our fellows rather than sow broadcast poison gas that dethrones reason and leads men blindly to destruction.

COST OF ELECTION

(o) They tell us "this special election will cost \$135,000."

This cost will not be reduced by voting "no" on the bonds. Whether it was wise or not to call a special election is not a matter now before

us. That has been done and it is history.

COST OF BUILDING

(p) They tell us that "labor and materials are high and why should not we use prison labor?"

They say "labor fully employed. At the present time labor is fully employed; vast public improvements ought to be carried on at a time when laboring men need work. Would it not be best to do part of our road work, at least, with a State-owned plant, with labor from the State Penitentiary? At the present time the cost of all materials is excessive."

The facts are these: The law of Oregon now already provides for the employment of convict labor upon our highways. It also provides for the purchase or lease of a paving plant by the State Highway Commission. As to cost of labor and materials, there has been no increase in the wage of common labor. The cost of sand and gravel, which is principally used in the construction of roads is a matter of local conditions and does not vary with the ups and downs of commerce generally.

Cement has slumped and we can buy it now for less than it could have been bought last year, or the year before. The price of asphalt I cannot state, but I do not think there has been any change.

For the law providing for the use of convict labor and a State paving plant, I refer you to Sections 8 and 13 of the State Highway Code.

LINN COUNTY TO INCREASE CROPS 15 OR 20 PER CENT

ALBANY, Ore., May 23—Linn County crops will be increased between 15 and 20 per cent this year over last, according to the estimates of C. J. Hurd, who superintended the organization of the Linn County Council of Defense. Reports received here indicate that this percentage of increased production will be general throughout the Willamette valley. The labor shortage is not acute now, but farmers say outside help will be necessary later in the year.

FRANCE ENFORCES WAR PROHIBITION

WHILE UNITED STATES STRUGGLES WITH THE PROBLEM, FRANCE HAS PLACED AN EFFECTIVE CHECK ON LIQUOR.

PARIS, May 2—(By Mail)—While the United States is struggling with the war prohibition problem, France is today quietly administering a most effective check to demon rum and its dire effect on national efficiency in war time.

In those districts of France where the highest efficiency is demanded of those engaged in vital war work or where vigilance and stamina are the order of the day strong drink is barred. Alcohol has been driven from the army zones, naval zones, munition zones; isolated where it is incapable of material interference with the war strength of the nation.

France's method is strict control. In every army zone of northern France, the commanding general is not only the supreme head of the military forces but "governor" of the civilian population. In these zones alcohol has been driven out. In every naval zone of the Atlantic and Mediterranean coasts strong drink is prohibited by the simple virtue of a decree issued by the admiral commanding the zone. Not only are sailors and men in national service denied the use of strong alcoholic beverages but all inhabitants of the zone, women as well as men. Albert Thomas, Minister of Munitions, has issued similar decrees to regulate the alcoholic consumption of the great munition making areas when these areas are not in military or naval zones. Not only have prohibitory measures been decreed but heavy penalties are imposed when workers, by any chance, set bad examples for fellow workers.
