GOVERNMENT WILL ANNOUNCE PLANS SOON

Klamath Project Among Those on Which Productive Lands to be increased-Bill in Congress Carries Appropriation of \$5,000,000 for Work. Klamath Project Lined Up With California Projecta.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 24-Withernment plans to take steps to put all of the uncultivated lands in the government reclamation districts within the borders of California under cultivation.

Word to this effect was brought to California yesterday by Elwood Mead, chairman of the state rural credits commission, who has returned from Washington where he consulted with Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane on the details of the plan to bring many thousand acres more into cultivation in this state.

They are the Orland project, which is located in Glenn County; the Yuma project, in Southern California and the Klamath project, part of which lies in this state.

Mead estimates that about 700,000 acres of land, now provided with water but not under cultivation, will be affected by the activities of the department of the interior.
