TEN ALMONDS HIT OVER 250

Ten members of the Arbuckle Almonds baseball squad hit over 250 last season according to the batting averages. Seven hit under, the lowest sticker being Strickler who hit .171 and is hitting .200 this season. Ten of the club are hitting over the .250 mark again this season, Sanders, H. N. Bailey, F. D. Traynham, L. Bailey, Moore, J. Gillaspay, McDonald, Hall, Woods, and West being in this class. When Mickey Shader faces the Almonds Sunday he will be going up against a team that administered a defeat to his supporters, the all stars, on one occasion last year. They struck out fourteen men on the Almond squad in that game but the Almonds managed to score two more runs than the Stars.

Below is the Almond line-up for that game except for Thode and Sullivan. Sanders will be with the club here and is leading with the batting list this year at a .555 clip. Dalley or Holmes will probably be the other pitcher.

Cook and Shader will be on the mound for Klamath Falls but Manager Watt has not decided which will work in the morning game, waiting to see how the visitors line up in Chico this afternoon. The infield has been out working daily on the diamond to take off the rough edges and outfielder Shandling is expected to make his debut Sunday.
