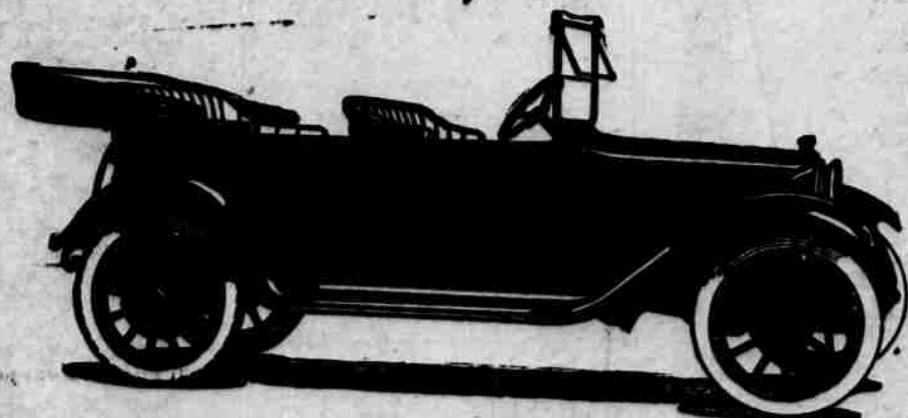

STREET LIGHTS ARE NOW USED

LIGHTS TURNED ON FIRST TIME SATURDAY NIGHT, GIVING MUCH MORE LIGHT THAN THE OLD ONES.

The new street lights contracted for between the city council and the California-Oregon Power Company are now a reality. The lights were turned on for the first time last Saturday night and the effect was brilliant. Many congratulatory comments were heard, both on the diligence of the council as well as the enterprise of the California-Oregon Power Company, for this much needed public improvement.

Klamath Falls has never heretofore had a street lighting system, tho there have been many ineffectual attempts made by the company to interest former councils in the subject. To Councilman Sheets credit for the present arrangement is largely due, because of his wide experience in the electrical field, and his thorough understanding of the subject.

The system just installed is thoroughly modern, being known as Series Incandescent, using the latest type of Nitrogen filled lamps, and provision is made for expansion as the future demands may arise. It is also provided that should lamps of additional candle power be required at any point the change can be made as desired.

This installation represents an expenditure by the power company of \$12,000.00.

Klamath County Liberty Loan
