DROP TONS OF BOMBS ON SUB BASE AND TOWNS

ARTILLERY FIRE INDICATES IMPORTANT MOVE

England Has Lost Only Six Per Cent of Coastal Ships—25 Per Cent Allowed English Food Dictator Tells Associated Press—Madrid Has Disordered—Austrians Form Parade for Peace.

BERLIN June 1—London reports indicate the probability that an important military increment by the allies is under way on the Belgian front with the possibility of an attempt to deal a crushing blow to the German bank on the coast.

LONDON, June 1—England has lost only six per cent of her aerial ships according to a statement given the Associated Press by Kennedy Jones, England's director of food economy today.

COPENHAGEN, June 1—Vienna dispatches received here say that simultaneously with the opening of the Australian parliament, thousands of workmen ceased work and organized a great procession as a demonstration in favor of peace.

MADRID, June 1—Disorders with many soldiers participating occurred at Barcelona today.

RUSSO WORKMEN DECLARE STRIKES

DETERMINED TO PARALYZE PETROGRAD WAR FACTORIES. CONSTITUTION BOARD FAILS TO REACH AGREEMENT.

LONDON, June 1—Workmen have determined upon strikes or other measures to paralyze production in over one hundred twenty of the largest Petrograd factories, most of which are engaged in war work, according to dispatches received here.

PORT OF NEW YORK NET GATE CLOSED

NEW YORK, June 1—For reasons which the navy yard and customs officials refused to reveal, the port of New York has been closed to all shipping by the shutting of the gate in the steel net, closing the harbor. This net was placed in position soon after the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany.

CITY SCHOOLS RUN ON INCOME

NO SPECIAL SCHOOL TAXES HAVE BEEN LEVIED FOR THREE YEARS AND THIS YEAR PART OF STATE MONIES RETURNED.

The Klamath Falls School District officers have kept the district expenditures for the past year under its income to such an extent that considerable of its state allotment has been returned to its original fund as required by state law, according to the yearly report compiled by Miss Ida B. Momyer, school clerk.

The report shows that the sum of \$649.91 has been received from the county treasurer from the district tax; \$24,204.80 from the county school superintendent for the county fund; \$1,870.20 from the county superintendent for the state fund; from interest on school money, \$399.12; from interest on Conger estate, \$1,967.76; cash on hand June, 1916, \$41,769.93.

OREGON "U" TO HAVE RED CROSS

DR. EBERLE KUYKENDALL, '08, TO BE CAPTAIN

Hope to Enlist Men Entirely From Oregon Students—\$4800 Required to Finance the Corps—California Has Sent Three Small Units to France Already.

The following letter has been received by Judge D. V. Kuykendall, of this city, from Walter C. Winslow, president of the University of Oregon Alumni Association, relative to the forming of a University Ambulance Corps under the auspices of the American Red Cross.

The letter is as follows: "An effort to establish a University of Oregon Ambulance Corps under the auspices of the American Red Cross has gained a very substantial footing here and we are writing you a letter at this time to ascertain, if possible, before August 1st, whether you will not, both in men and money this movement can gain from Klamath Falls and vicinity.

"Dr. Eberle Kuykendall, '08 was sponsor for the movement in the beginning and has received his captain's commission. There seems no doubt that this corps will be organized. The doctors for the corps have been with one exception, enlisted, but there is still need of enlisted men. The hope is that the corps may be composed entirely of University of Oregon alumni and students.
