O. A. C. CORVALLIS, Ore., June 2. There are from 300 to 350 thousand acres of summer fallow in Eastern Oregon which should produce some kind of cultivated crops this year and, since it is too late to plant field peas, the most suitable crops left are beans, corn and the small grains in the cultivated rows. Corn is particularly recommended inasmuch as it will save the feeding of grain to livestock.

Prof. Hyslop, Farm Crops authority at O. A. C. asserts that at an altitude of 2,500 feet, and where there is reasonable good rainfall, beans may be successfully produced on summer fallow that has been plowed early. Beans may be seeded with a grain drill in rows 4 to 6 feet apart, and from 4 to 6 or 8 inches apart in the rows. Early maturing bush varieties are desirable. Lady Washingtons, Mexican Tree beans, and Red Mexicos are all very successful. Ten to 15 pounds of seed per acre is sufficient and a yield of not less than 400 to 500 pounds per acre may be expected, and indications are that prices for

beans will be good next fall. This small amount, if given good cultivation, will leave the summer fallow in practically as good condition for the succeeding wheat crop as if it had been cultivated clean all summer, and most of the work will be done before the harvest season.

Bean handling and harvesting equipment is not expensive. The summer fallow lands of Oregon should raise a million bushels of beans this year and we will need all of them this fall. Plant as soon as possible after danger of frost is over.

Early corn planted in wide rows is a good crop for hog, cattle, horse or sheep feed. Eastern Oregon can put enough dry shelled corn on the market to ship in carload lots. Wheat or barley may be planted in rows 4 to 6 feet apart on summer fallow and, with slight cultivation to keep the weeds down, will produce good crops. Now crops should be planted so the rows run across the direction of the prevailing winds. Utilize all the summer fallow in beans, corn, root crops or the small grains in rows.

A term in jail without option of paying a fine.

The War Department will not leave very much to chance in determining if any men of the designated age have not registered.

Already the machinery for an elaborate checking up of the registration lists after War Census day has been prepared. Men not registered who are suspected of having evaded registration will have to prove that they have not attained their 21st birthday, or that they have passed their 31st birthday.

Within five days after War Census day, the clerk of each registration board must post in a conspicuous place an alphabetical list of all men who have submitted themselves for registration. It will be the duty of any citizen knowing a man subject to registration whose name is not on the list, to report that fact to the authorities.

Furthermore, all police officers, deputy United States Marshal, etc., are required to report at once names of men known to them to have evaded registration.

CUTWORMS DOING DAMAGE HERE

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT GIVES REMEDIES FOR PAST PRESENCE OF WHICH ARE REPORTED IN MANY PLACES.

Cutworms are doing a large amount of damage this year in Klamath County according to H. R. Glaisyer, county agricultural agent.

A large number of city people are also complaining of the damage done to gardens and farmers complain of the pest attacking young alfalfa.

This pest can be controlled effectively if the formulas given below are used according to Mr. Glaisyer.

Cutworms are a very serious pest of nearly all our crops. Ornamental shrubs, gardens and truck crops, field crops and even small fruits and orchards suffer from the attack of these pests. The sleek, well fed, gray caterpillars, varying in size when mature, from one to two inches, are too well known to require a description. The adult moths are nocturnal in habit, flying mostly at night. The majority of the medium sized, smoky gray and brownish moths, at which are attracted to the lights, are adults of the cutworm caterpillars.

The remedies are: The poison bran mash, consisting of bran 16 pounds, paris green one pound, salt one-half pound, cheap syrup one gallon, and warm water to make a coarse mash. This is the standard remedy for cutworms. This may be placed on a field prepared for a crop or may be placed about the base of the plants when they appear. Poultry should not be allowed free range over a treated field. Green succulent forage of any kind may be sprayed with an arsenical, moved and placed in small heaps about the field, preferably in the evening. Where these methods are impractical arsenical sprays applied to the host are of some assistance. For young plants just set in the field, as cabbage and tomato, a mechanical barrier consisting of a cylinder of tin or cardboard may be shoved about the plant.

For the climbing cutworms, which attack the developing buds of our fruit trees in early spring, the poison bait is very good. But better still, is a belt of some sticky material about the trunk of the tree, or some mechanical device such as a piece of cardboard attached funnel shaped, tight at the top and flared below. Cotton batten may be used in a similar manner. Wrap a strip eight inches wide about the tree overlapping it on the edges where it meets. Tie this band at the lower edge, then, taking hold of the upper edge, roll it down over the bottom edge. This makes a very effective funnel.
