**MONSTER RED CROSS
MEETING HELD HERE**

der, and President Wilson created
two committees to direct its work, the
Red Cross war finance, which gathers
funds, and the Red Cross council,
which spends the money.

"Such men as H. P. Davidson, the
head of the Morgan interests, is head
of the war council, and Mr. Ward, for-
merly international Y. M. C. A. head,
is chairman of the finance committee.

They have had experience in gathering
and spending millions of dollars.

"Anyone can join the Red Cross by
spending from \$1 to \$100. From \$1 to
\$10 gives an annual membership, and is
an annual due. From \$25 to \$100 gives
a paid in full membership. For \$2 and
up the members receive the Red Cross
magazine. There were at the begin-
ning of the war 500,000 members in
this country, but we are far behind other
countries, even then. Japan had
1,800,000 members, England 1,400,000
members and France 1,000,000 mem-
bers. Anyone joining the Red Cross
does not obligate himself to service in
the field, and is not subject to call,
albeit he may do so if he desires.

"The Red Cross has two main ob-
jects, the relief of the sufferers during

conflict, and constructive relief work
as has been done in Belgium.

"In this work it rehabilitates a coun-
try, keeps the people at home in good
health, comfort and from need that
they may stand the strain thru which
they must go.

"No one need fear that the money he
gives to the Red Cross will be wasted,
for its constitution provides that 95 per
cent of the money must be actually
used in relief work, and only 5 per cent
for clerk hire and overhead expense.

"The United States is undertaking a
stupendous task when it entered the
war," said H. D. Mortenson, in speak-
ing on "Our Unpreparedness." "It is
pitting its strength against that of a
machine and a country which has been
training for such a struggle for forty
years, and is prepared to conduct a
seven years' war. The task of training
2,000,000 men for a single army is alone
a stupendous undertaking, and takes
time.

"In speaking recently with the Pa-
cific Coast director of the Red Cross
work, he asked that we devote our
time for the next month in securing
members and funds for the local chap-
ters. Funds so that supplies may be
purchased and stored, and then order-
ed out as they may be needed.

"The Red Cross is now a military or-
ganization, and it receives its orders
how, when and what to do from Wash-
ington, D. C.

"Its organization consists of a board
of managers which appoints chairmen
of five standing committees, and the
chairmen of these standing committees
appoint chairmen of sub-committees.
The five standing committees are:
publicity, membership, finances, mili-
tary relief and civil relief work.

"The military relief committee is as-
sisted into the base hospital unit, the
surgical section, sanitary detachment,
hospital supplies, warehouse and stor-
age, and the packing and shipping
units.

"The civil relief work is to be con-
ducted in time of local, national, inter-
national disasters, and the taking care
of dependent families of non-combat-
ants.

"An important Red Cross meeting
was held in Portland today, and after
this meeting and our representative,
Captain J. W. Siemens, returns, we can
appoint the remainder of our com-
mittees, organize further, and proceed
with our work here.

"The thing to do now is to get mem-
bers and raise finances."

"There were forty American soldiers
died of preventable disease where one
died of bullets," said Chas. F. Stone
in speaking on the subject of "What the
Red Cross Did Not Do During the
Spanish American War." "While I was
in the Philippine Islands I saw no Red
Cross organizations, but saw plenty of
opportunities for one. There are plenty
of opportunities for those at home to
work, and work with the Red Cross.
When we crossed into Manchuria I
got my first square meal from a Jap-
anese Red Cross unit, and the Jap-
anese army, one of the most efficient mil-
itary organizations I have ever seen,
lost but one soldier by disease where
they lost forty by bullets. The food
the soldier gets is not of a particularly
varied nature, and the Red Cross has
a great opportunity to aid the boys in
the field."

Red Cross nurses "to be."

ers as were the machines in the long pa-
rade.

tin formed the committee in charge of
the parade, and Dr. E. D. Johnson was
chairman of the program committee at
the opera house.
