

**DOG MEAT IS NOW
USED IN BELGIUM**

AMSTERDAM, June 6.—According to the Antwerp correspondent of the Handelsblad, the German authorities at Ghent have issued an administrative order granting permission to the city of Ghent for the erection of a dog slaughterhouse. One of the regulations provides that no dog butcher may supply more than about two pounds of dog meat a week to each family.

In the opinion of the correspondent quoted, there is no doubt this example soon will be followed in other towns of Belgium, for want is increasing day by day.

**MONGOLIA FIRED
AND IS FIRED ON**

OCCURRED JUNE 1ST, SHIP 250
MILES FROM ENGLISH COAST.
THE VESSEL ESCAPED BY MA-
NEUVERING

LONDON, June 6.—The American steamship Mongolia fired four shots at a submarine on June 1st, and the submarine discharged a torpedo at the liner. Neither was damaged.

NEW YORK, June 5.—The Mongolia was 250 miles from England when the submarine appeared and fired. The steamship escaped the torpedo by maneuvering, then opened up with

her guns and the sub-boat fled. The Mongolia arrived safely.

This is the third or fourth encounter with submarines the Mongolia has had, in which she has always been successful.

RUSSIA DESIRES TO**RECOGNIZE CHINA**

PEKING, June 6.—Prince Koudacheff, the Russian minister at Peking, has advised the foreign office that he has been instructed by his home government to continue in charge of the legation in China.

The minister also advised the Chinese government that Russia desires to send a special envoy to China, for the purposes of conferring a high honor upon President Li Yuan-hung and expressing Russia's appreciation of China's formal recognition of the provisional government at Petrograd.

Food Preparedness Campaign

The food situation demands liberal production. It is imperative that every acre capable of producing crops be planted to those things which will be in demand. The Pacific Northwest is located at the end of transportation lines. We must specialize on food stuffs that yield a large amount of nutrients per acre, and that can be shipped readily. Oregon farmers should produce large quantities of the early maturing spring grains and other seeds for this year. We should specialize on spring wheat, spring barley and on heavier, wetter lands spring oats is an especially good crop to grow.

We will also seriously need crops that will make cheap food for livestock, spring oats and spring barley will also be in demand to a considerable extent this year for hay purposes. Corn makes one of our highest yielding producers of stock feed, both for grain and for silage purposes. Early varieties of corn such as Minnesota No. 23, Oregon Dent, Minnesota King, will provide an abundance of grain for hog, sheep and cattle feed, and even to some extent for horse feeding purposes.

Later varieties, such as Minnesota No. 13, Golden Glow, Pride of the North, and so forth, will give a good tonnage of silage of excellent quality. Of these crops, oats suffers most by late seeding. Wheat should be seeded as promptly as possible. Barley should be seeded as early as possible, but is injured least of the small cereals by

late seeding. Corn should not be seeded until the ground warms up well and is ordinarily not planted until May 1st or afterward, except in extremely warm sections.

One of our best crops for moderately late planting is the field bean, especially of the Lady Washington variety. Varieties of the early white and colored bush beans will give splendid returns under conditions in most warm Southern Oregon and Willamette Valley counties, as well as the Columbia Basin section. Beans are successful only after the land warms up well, and no crop is more productive of food per acre.

Sugar beets, mangels, rutabagas and carrots can still be seeded for a while, and are good crops to grow at this time—the sugar beets for sugar manufacture, the other roots for stock feeding purposes, and in some localities for drying. Potatoes have a wide range of planting, and may be planted very late. Indications are, however, that our acreage of potatoes will be ample.

Liberal plantings of clover should be made with the grain in order to provide hay for next year's needs.

Most of these crops thrive better if planted early, but some of them, such as the barley, corn and flax will give fairly good returns when planted late. Of the crops which may be planted late, flax for seed is one of the best. Flax for seed purposes is very necessary in our system in the Northwest,

and the linseed cake makes splendid feed for livestock.

Another crop which is usually planted late, and which does well, is buckwheat—on moist soils the Tartarian buckwheat; on others, the Japanese or Silver hull variety.

Millet may be seeded late for hay purposes, although it should be used only in an emergency in that it is not very productive except on very warm soils. Kale is one of our best producers of succulence for livestock, and may be transplanted in June or July, when there is sufficient moisture in the soil. Turnips seeded late make fine stock feed.
