OREGON'S CROPS BEGIN TO GROW

PROGRESS SLOW BUT SATISFACTORY LAST WEEK—GRAIN SEED—BEETS ARE READY TO THIN AND PLANTING CONTINUES

PORTLAND, June 7.—Back yard gardens and truck crops throughout Oregon made slow progress last week, especially during the cool days near the close of the week, according to the crop summary for the week ending June 5th, compiled by the Portland office of the weather bureau. The summary follows:

"All crops during the week made slow but otherwise satisfactory progress. The first four days were the most favorable ones of the season, but the cool weather in the last three days checked further advancement very materially.

"Barley, oats, rye and spring wheat seeding is nearly finished, and these crops are coming up nicely. At Agency Plains rye is beginning to head. Winter wheat, hops and sugar beets made satisfactory progress. Sugar beets are ready to thin and weed. Potato planting continues, and the planting of crops has only just begun. Early potatoes look well and they are now high enough to cultivate. Truck crops and gardens made slow growth, especially during the cool days near the close of the week.

"Meadows are somewhat uneven, but on the whole are making satisfactory progress, considering the lateness of the season. Ranges are in excellent condition, and stock is getting fat. The first cutting of alfalfa has begun in a number of places, and the crop is up to expectations.

"Italian prunes have dropped badly, and in a few localities the cherries have also dropped more than usual, at their present stage of growth. Other fruit on the whole is in a promising condition."

MAYOR ISSUES ANNUAL MESSAGE

but an ordinance conforming to the law of 1917 is now in the hands of the Judiciary committee for consideration. By reason of the large number of gardens within the city, I have made special effort to abate the nuisance of loose stock, much impounding having been done, and some arrests of persons allowing their stock to run at large having been made. Traffic conditions are good, and the ordinances generally obeyed. Little trouble has been caused by violators on the business streets, but there has been complaints of speeders on residence streets and a number of arrests have been made. During the epidemic of rabies the dog-muzzling ordinance was effectively enforced, thus, presumably from the fact that no rabies cases were reported, protecting the citizens, and at the same time ridding the city of many stray and worthless dogs.

Streets

During the year the city has improved Canal Road in Second Hot Springs Addition, providing drainage for the entire district, and especially helping conditions, as this portion of the city is not served. Most of the unimproved streets were graded this spring, thus providing definite side ditches and putting some crown on the streets. I recommend that this work be continued until all such thoroughfares are well crowned. The streets were dragged as usual, some of them, in fact, two and three times, owing to rains following. I recommend the further improvement of Wantland as necessary for the use of the Mills Addition section of the city.

Last summer Eleventh street was hard-surfaced at a cost of about \$12,000, and Shippington road, now nearing completion, at a cost of about \$20,000. In connection with the construction of this road the city acquired title to a site for public dock on Upper Lake.

Health

Our citizens have responded heartily to pleas made in fly nuisance campaigns, with the result that we have had practically no typhoid fever or other diseases that might exist from the presence of flies. In this connection I urge that continued vigilance be exercised by both citizens and officers to see that no accumulations of manure or fly-breeding refuse be permitted. The abatement of the Ankeny canal has doubtless contributed to our immunity from disease. Many residences have connected with the sewer system, and ordinances on this subject should be promptly and rigidly enforced.

Improvements

Much remodeling has been done on Main street, greatly adding to its good appearance, and a number of new residences have been built. A new street lighting system has been installed, giving far more light at very little more expense than formerly, the cost of construction being about \$12,000 to the utility company. Other lighting improvements have been made at a cost of about \$2,250. The value

of telephone improvement during the year has been about \$6,000.

Legal Department

The only case now pending to which the city is a party is that of City vs. California-Oregon Power company, a decision in which has been promised and is expected at an early date. The city has been a successful party to one mandamus and two injunction proceedings during the year. All legal steps in connection with the construction of the municipal railroad have been undertaken and completed, except the nominal connection the city will have with condemnation of right-of-way actions. The city attorney advises me that he is ready to report on the matter of securing a bridge over the irrigation canal at Eleventh street, with reference to which it is possible that litigation may arise. The city has granted a franchise to Keno Power company for installation of electric service, which franchise has been accepted.

General

I urge that the camp ground set aside for tourists be further improved, and that special effort be made to make tourists welcome and comfortable during their stay. Much improvement in private property is noted in the way of neater premises and better kept lawns, and I hope our property owners will continue the good work, comparatively inexpensive, but greatly enhancing the appearance and value of premises and the homelike atmosphere of the city. Such improvements evidence a faith and belief in our city and are largely the measure of a citizen's pride.
