22 COUNTIES VOTE HIGHWAYS

LANE VOTES FOUR TO ONE AGAINST AND LINN THREE TO ONE — KLAMATH AND LAKE COUNTIES FOR IT

Practically complete returns from all the counties in the state give a majority of approximately 17,000 in favor of the \$4,000,000 road bond issue.

The figures as compiled are: Yes, 52,518; no, 51,383; majority for 17,235. The counties giving the heaviest vote against the bonds were Baker, Benton, Clackamas, Lane, Linn, Marion and Union. In Lane the vote was nearly four to one against. In Linn it was three to one.

The counties which gave the road bond a majority were: Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Crook, Deschutes, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Hood River, Jackson, Josephine, Klamath, Lake, Malheur, Multnomah, Polk, Sherman, Tillamook, Umatilla, Wasco, Washington and Yamhill.

The others voted against it, including Benton, Baker, Clackamas, Curry, Harney, Jefferson, Lane, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Morrow, Union, Wallowa, Wheeler not in.

SAILORS REPORT U. S. SHIP SUNK

SURVIVORS OF FRENCH SHIP SUBBED ON MAY 31ST SAY THAT BIG AMERICAN LINER WAS SUNK, AND CREW MURDERED

PARIS, June 8.—Survivors of the French sailing ship Jeanne Cordonniers, which was torpedoed in the British channel on May 31st, report that a submarine torpedoed a big American liner and also shelled and sunk the small boat which contained the crew of the liner.

The survivors of the Cordonniers reached Havre in their open boats. They declare they witnessed the destruction of the American ship after their own vessel had been sunk.

GOETHALS FIRES TWO ASSISTANTS

STATEMENTS HE HOLDS UP PRO-GRAM, BY WOODEN SHIPBUILDERS, IS CAUSE FOR SUMMARY DISMISSAL

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Major General Goethals, general manager of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, has dismissed F. A. Eustis of Boston, assistant general manager, and F. H. Clark of New York, the two engineers who originated the wooden fleet idea.

The dismissal followed their action last night in issuing statements which virtually charged Goethals with holding up the shipbuilding program in the nation's present emergency.

WHEAT CROP TO BE 666,000,000 BUSHELS

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The prospective wheat crop forecast of the nation issued by the department of agriculture places it at 666,000,000 bushels for 1917, as compared with 640,000,000 bushels harvested last year. The average for 1914 and 1915 was 604,000,000 bushels.

KLAMATH BOYS GO TO OHIO

HOAGLAND, PETERS, SKELTON, WEEKS AND McCOLLUM HAVE RECEIVED THEIR PERMANENT ASSIGNMENT, DAYTON, OHIO

Extracts from a letter received from Lou Hoagland this morning contain information calculated to be of interest to Herald readers. He says in part:

"I am leaving for Dayton, Ohio, within the next three weeks, also Ray Peters, Joe Skelton, Wm. Weeks and Everett McCollum.

"Our captain just arrived in his aeroplane and told us our orders. He is a real nice fellow. He has just left, and is giving us an exhibition now in the air.

Out of 4,500 men our squadron is the only one that has a captain. Some class to us. The squadron has 21 trucks, 17 motorcycles, four touring cars, 24 aeroplanes active, and 12 in reserve. We are to leave for Dayton some time the last of this month, and Dayton will be our permanent station. Pete, McCollum and I are going as expert gas engine men, the highest line in this branch of the service. The others are going as mechanics, assemblers and bookkeepers, some as carpenters and electricians. Our pay was started at \$30 a month the 1st of June, and the experts will get about \$10 when they begin work.

"I will be only about 24 miles from Nate's folks, and will get a chance to visit them, which I will do as soon as possible. Got a long letter from Gordon this morning, and he enclosed \$10 in it. The bunch is going to San Antonio and have a big feed this afternoon. He's a prince."
