AMERICANS IN ISLES SURPRISED

AMERICA IN WAR DOES NOT ALTER THEIR STATUS IN ENGLAND, AND MUST OBSERVE THE WAR RULES

LONDON, May 26.—(Correspondent Associated Press).—Many Americans in London were surprised and disappointed when they learned that, when the United States entered the war, they were not automatically relieved of the necessity of observing the British police regulations affecting aliens. This is especially true of the Americans who have arrived here since the early part of 1916. These must report their movements to the authorities just as well as all other aliens, whether allies or neutrals, are required to do.

There is a considerable amount of red tape involved in the police regulations, and no sooner had the United States thrown in its lot on the side of the entente allies than many Americans got the impression that they would be relieved of this war-time necessity. When they found out that their status in this respect remained unchanged by the turn of events many of them appealed to the United States embassy and consulate for further information. They were told that there was no indication of any change.

Every American who has arrived here since the early months of 1916 must have an identity book. Besides name, nationality, date and a signed photograph, it must bear the signatures and guarantees of two British subjects, property owners, who have, at the same time, seen the holder of the book sign his name to it. Before the book is received a signed photograph must be left at the police station. In some instances two months elapses before the applicant is able to obtain his book.

When an American moves from one part of the city to another he must report to the police stations in both districts and have his book stamped by the "aliens" officer. Much the same procedure is required when he goes on a visit to another city. In every town where he stays over night he must report to the police, giving all particulars as to birth, nationality of self and parents, a description of physical features, etc. At the hotel at which he stays he must repeat all these same details on a large sheet of paper, which he is required to sign again before he can leave the hotel.

In certain sections of England a new rule has just been put into effect which requires aliens to first present themselves at police headquarters before they will be given a room in a hotel.

The police issue a permit entitling the holder to stay at the hotel.

A party of American business men from London were required to do this recently upon their arrival in Liverpool. Their train brought them into Liverpool around 3 a. m. They were tired and hungry, and the trip to the police station consumed another hour. But all went thru with the red tape good naturedly, realizing that to be allowed to travel at all in any of the belligerent countries at this time is somewhat of a privilege.

WILSON'S MESSAGE TO RUSSIANS

many are using every possible instrumentality, are making use even of the influence of groups and parties among their own subjects to whom they have never been just or fair, or even tolerant, to promote a propaganda on both sides of the sea which will preserve their influence at home and power abroad to the undoing of the very men they are using.

"The position of America in this war is so clearly avowed that no man can be excused for mistaking it. She seeks no material profit or aggrandizement of any kind. She is fighting for no advantage or selfish object of her own, but for the liberation of peoples everywhere from the aggressions of autocratic force. The ruling classes in Germany have begun of late to profess a like liberality and justice of purpose, but only to preserve the power they have set up in Germany and the selfish advantages which they have wrongfully gained for themselves and their private projects of power all the way from Berlin to Bagdad and beyond. Government after government has by their influence, without open conquest of its territory, been linked together by a link of intrigue directed by nothing less than the peace and liberty of the world. The meshes of that intrigue must be broken, but cannot be broken unless wrongs already done are undone; and adequate measures must be taken to prevent it from ever again being reweaved or repaired.

Fighting for Liberty
"Of course, the Imperial German government and those whom it is using for their own undoing, are seeking to obtain pledges that the war will end in the restoration of the status quo ante. It was the status quo ante out of which this iniquitous war issued forth, the power of the Imperial German government within the empire and its widespread domination and influence outside of that empire. That status must be altered in such fashion as to prevent any such hideous thing from ever happening again.

"We are fighting for the liberty, the self-government and the undictated development of all peoples, and every feature of the settlement that concludes this war must be conceived and executed for that purpose. Wrongs must first be righted and then adequate safeguard must be created to prevent their being committed again.

We ought not to consider remedies merely because they have a pleasing and sonorous sound.

Practical questions can be settled only by practical means. Phrases will not achieve the result. Effective readjustments will; and whatever readjustments are necessary will be made.

Free People Together
"But they must follow a principle; and that principle is plain. No people must be forced under sovereignty under which it does not wish to live. No territory must change hands except for the purpose of securing those who inhabit it a fair chance of life and liberty. No indemnities must be insisted on except those that constitute payment for manifest wrong done. No readjustments of power must be made except such as will tend to secure the future peace of the world and the future welfare and happiness of its peoples.

"And then the free peoples of the world must draw together in some common covenant, some genuine and practical co-operation that will in effect combine their force to secure peace and justice in the dealings of nations with one another. The brotherhood of mankind must no longer be a fair but empty phrase; it must be given a structure of force and reality. The nations must realize their common life and effect a workable partnership to secure that life against the aggressions of autocratic and self-pleasing power.

Must Pour Out Blood
"For these things we can afford to pour out blood and treasure. For these are the things we have always professed to desire, and unless we pour out blood and treasure now and succeed, we may never be able to unite or show conquering force again in the great cause of liberty. The day has come to conquer or submit. If the forces of autocracy can divide us, they will overcome us; if we stand together victory is certain and the liberty which victory will secure. We can afford, then, to be generous, but we cannot afford, then or now, to be weak or omit any single guarantee of justice and security."
