CALIFORNIA BOYS GO TO FARMING

SUMMER VACATION MAY BE IN-
DEFINITELY PROLONGED, AND
THE RETURN TO SCHOOL WILL
PROBABLY BE LATE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—There
is a possibility that the 47,000 high
school boys of the state will have their
summer vacation indefinitely prolonged.
Instead of returning to their books
on August 1st, it may be well into Sep-
tember, or even October, before they
are called on to report at their classes.

A plan has been submitted to the
San Francisco school board by Judge
Thomas F. Graham, chairman of the
county council of defense, whereby
high school boys shall be permitted to
go to the country and help harvest the
crops, and yet be given their credits
the same as though they were attend-
ing school.

Members of the council expressed
the belief that the safe harvesting of
the bumper crops this fall depends to
a large extent upon the success of
Judge Graham's plan.

Many farmers have written to the
local council as the result of a similar
suggestion made by Judge Graham
some weeks ago. There was much
complaint following this suggestion,
however, on the score that the boys
would lose their school credits.

Under Judge Graham's plan, how-
ever, the vacation period would be ex-
tended for several weeks—or until the
crops are all harvested—and those
boys who assist in the work shall re-
ceive the usual credits.

OVERCOATS SCARCE

IN GERMANY

COPENHAGEN, May 25.—Only an
old person or an invalid is permitted to
have a winter as well as a summer
overcoat in Germany, under new or-
ders issued by the German imperial
clothing bureau. It is learned here. In
addition, the person desiring to have
two overcoats must produce a medical
certificate stating that the physical
condition of the applicant is such as
to make the winter coat necessary.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—Re-
ports received last week from approx-
imately two dozen of the well known
fishing districts of California show
about an equal division between poor
and good. Results obtained in the
Sierra Nevada region are the least en-
couraging, with the exception of Hunt-
ington Lake, which reports excellent
catches. The cause generally is as-
cribed to the water being too high.

Lonnie Tucker, the lightweight box-
er who, with his brother Frankie, came
to San Francisco under the manage-
ment of their sister Elizabeth from
Tulsa, Oklahoma, to engage in four
round bouts here, has enlisted in the
engineer corps of the regular army,
and will serve his country at a com-
pensation of \$30 per month. He is re-
ceiving his preliminary training at
Fort McDowell.

Manager Del Howard of the Oakland
club of the Pacific Coast League is
having a hard time finding someone to
fit into the first base position. He has
just secured Miller of the Western
League as the fourth candidate to be
tried out on the initial sack. Miller's
batting record in the Western League
was .344, which included ten home
runs. He stole twenty-three bases, and
had a fielding average of .990. He re-
places Warren Adams.

Hugo Bezdek, who is scout for the
Pittsburg Nationals, and also coach of
the University of Oregon football team,
said while in Spokane recently that in
his opinion the general sentiment
among the colleges and universities of
the Northwest is that athletics, so far
as possible, should be continued dur-
ing the war.

Washington State College will be a
contender in all branches of athletics
in the coast conference next year, ac-
cording to a decision reached at a re-
cent meeting of the athletic council of
the college. In reaching the decision
the athletic mentors were influenced
by the opinion of government and mili-
tary authorities that the continuation
of athletics in the colleges of the Uni-
ted States will go a long way toward
moulding the physical types of men
that are needed at the present time.

14 GERMAN SHIPS TAKEN AND NAMED

GERMAN NAMES ARE CHANGED,
ONE BEING NAMED AFTER PA-
MOUS GERMAN-AMERICAN
FRIEND OF LINCOLN'S

The American government has taken
over the interned German ships since
the war began, and has and is prepar-
ing them for active service, many al-
ready going in.

The navy department authorizes the
following:
Secretary of the Navy Daniels an-
nounced that the names of the seized
German ships that have been assigned
to the navy have been changed as fol-
lows:

Geier to Schurz.
Breslau to Bridgeport.
Kiel to Camden.
Leibniz to Houston.
Saxonia to Savannah.
Vogensen to Quincy.
Nicaria to Pensacola.
Odenwald to Newport News.
Hohenfels to Long Beach.
Andromeda to Bath.
Rudolf Blumberg to Beaufort.
Präsident to Kittery.
Locksun to Gulfport.

One Named for Carl Schurz
The Geier, the German gunboat
which was interned at Honolulu and
taken over by this government after
the declaration of war, is renamed for
Carl Schurz, the famous German-Amer-
ican soldier and statesman. A native
of Prussia, Schurz was one of the
heroes of the ill-fated revolution of
1848, and, after that historic uprising
against the Prussian autocracy, found
a haven in America. He was one of
Lincoln's strongest supporters and
served in the United States army thru
the Civil War, holding the rank of
major general. Later he was United
States senator from Missouri and was
secretary of the interior in President
