

HOW THE KIDDIES CAN HELP CROSS

FIVE AND TEN CENT PIECES USUALLY SPENT FOR JELLY BEANS, ETC., WILL SUPPLY A BANDAGE FOR WOUNDED SOLDIER

What part can the "kiddies," the tender, big-hearted little boys and girls, do to help win the war?

This is one of the questions that has been interesting the leaders in the great Red Cross drive for \$400,000.

They believe they have arrived at a solution of it and will attempt to arouse the enthusiasm of the youngsters to a pitch as keen as that of the grownups who are waging the battle for the dollars.

The plan is to enlist the assistance of the parents and urge them to instill at this time the patriotic need of exercising self-sacrifice and self-restraint in the smaller things that eat up the pennies and nickels that the "kiddies" spend for "candy" and goodies of all kinds.

Parents will also be urged to help their children to earn a few more pennies or dimes during the next few weeks than they have been in the habit of doing, and to ask the kiddies to save their earnings above what they actually need, and give them to the Red Cross fund.

There are nearly 100,000 children of school age in Oregon, and there are, or soon will be, out of school for their summer vacations, and the Red Cross committee is confident that the thousands of young patriots will be able to make a splendid showing in gifts to the Red Cross if they exercise a little more energy, perseverance and thrift

in working for the great relief movement.

If the school children of Oregon averaged only a dime apiece they would swell the Red Cross fund by a magnificent sum of over \$3,000. If they averaged but a nickel apiece the grand total would be between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

How important the pennies and nickels and dimes may be in the alleviation of suffering and misery among the wounded on the battlefields of Europe, where American soldiers will soon be doing their bit to help win the war, is shown by some figures prepared by the Red Cross. For example:

One cent will buy iodine to disinfect a wound.

One cent will buy enough gauze for one dressing.

A nickel will buy a bandage.

Eight cents will pay for a temporary splint.

A dime will provide chloroform for an operation.

Twenty-five cents expended as above may save a limb or a life of a wounded soldier.

Every man, woman and child in the state can do something in this gigantic Red Cross campaign. There will be many of those who are not circumscribed so as to be among the heavy givers, but there never was a movement in the history of philanthropy which offered such abundant opportunity for the high and low, rich and poor to join hands in the common cause as is presented by the American Red Cross.

The humble penny, the modest nickel and the bright little dime, each can and does do a definite practical thing toward the work that is before us to do. The child's mite and the rich man's millions will each be received with equal welcome and each will serve the same degree of efficiency in the Red Cross work.

TEACHERS HOLD MEET ON JULY 7

PORTLAND WILL BE PATRIOTICALLY DECORATED FOR THE 1917 CONVENTION OF NATIONAL EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION

PORTLAND, June 12.—From the little school house in the country to the great university in the city, educators and teachers will come to the 1917 convention of the National Education Association, which begins here on July 7th and lasts a full week. Americanism and preparedness, according to reports received here from Robert J. Aley of Orono, Maine, president of the association, and in charge of the program, will form the keynote of the gathering.

Portland will be decorated in red, white and blue for the convention, the big municipal auditorium, where the sessions will be held, will be hung in national colors and speakers will dwell on patriotic subjects.

Three Northwest governors, James Withycombe of Oregon, Ernest Lister of Washington and Moses Alexander of Idaho, have promised to speak. A fourth governor, W. D. Stephens of California, has been invited to make an address.

PROPOSE SCHOOL MERGER UP JULY

ALBANY AND PACIFIC, TWO OF OLDEST INSTITUTIONS IN THE NORTHWEST, PROBABLY TO COMBINE WORK

PORTLAND, June 12.—Proposed merger of two Oregon sectarian educational institutions, the Albany College, a Presbyterian school at Albany, and the Pacific University, a Congregational institution at Forest Grove, which has been pending for some time, is to be submitted for final action to the Presbyterian Synod here in July. The consolidation was proposed by the Pacific University, and has been favorably reported upon by a special committee representing the Albany school.

The two institutions are among the oldest in the Northwest. Albany was established in 1866 and Pacific in 1849. At present about 150 students are attending the Albany College and 125 are at Pacific. Consolidation would give the institutions combined endowments of approximately \$500,000, it is claimed.

Neither the name nor site of the consolidated institution has been determined. The Forest Grove school claims it has the larger campus and better buildings of the two. Opposition has arisen among Albany merchants and townspeople to the change of the school from that city, however.
