## U. S. NOT IN ON GREEK COUP

**INTEREST CENTERS ON WHETHER OR NOT GREECE WILL BE URGED TO AID ALLIES IN THE WAR NOW**

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The United States was not consulted about the allied coup in which King Constantine was deposed, and his son, Prince Alexander, succeeded.  
 America has not yet participated in the complex and complicated European diplomacy. So far, America is more of a military and economic than a diplomatic partner of the allies.

Interest centers in whether or not the allies will urge Greece to enter the war actively.

Constantine the First, King of the Hellenes, was born August 2, 1863, and succeeded his father, King George, on the throne on the assassination of the latter by a neurotic named Alexander Schinas, at Salonica, March 23, 1913. Constantine's mother was the Grand Duchess Olga of Russia, born in 1861.

King Constantine married in 1890 the Princess Sophie of Prussia, a sister of the present German emperor, Wilhelm.

They have three sons and three daughters: Prince George, Prince Alexander and Prince Paul.
