GENERAL CROP CONDITIONS GOOD

OREGON'S CROPS ALL GROWING EXCEPT CORN—LITTLE FROST AND SOME WORMS BOTHER IN SOME LOCALITIES

PORTLAND, June 14.—Growing grain fields throughout Oregon are in good condition, with the exception of corn, which is growing very slowly, according to the government weather bureau's summary of crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending June 12, 1917, made public. The statement follows:

"Weather conditions were favorable for the first few days, when it turned cooler, and frost formed in a few localities, but it did no harm of consequence.

"Winter wheat is now heading in places, and its condition is generally good. Spring wheat seeding is practically finished, and the crop is in all stages of development; some just coming up and some well stood and covering the ground nicely. Barley, oats and rye are making good progress, but corn is growing very slowly.

"Sugar beets and hops are in excellent condition. Hops are being cultivated and sugar beets are being thinned. Potatoes, truck crops and gardens are backward, but otherwise they are growing nicely.

"Meadows, pastures and ranges are in excellent condition. Haying has begun and the first crop of alfalfa is turning out satisfactorily.

"Fruit of all kind is promising."

UNITED STATES TO BUY ALASKA RAILROAD

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 14.—The interior department authorizes the following:

Secretary Lane announces that arrangements are being made for the

purchase of the Tanana Valley railroad, a privately owned line in Alaska. This road runs from Fairbanks to Chitana, with a branch to Chena, and traverses a country of agricultural and mineral wealth. This road will become a part of the government railroad system now under construction in Alaska, the main line of which runs to Fairbanks, and will make available for mining operations in the Fairbanks district the coal in the Nenana field about 100 miles south of Fairbanks, and adjacent to the main line.

Whereas, it is deemed expedient to change the present grade as established on that portion of Conger avenue northerly from the center line of California avenue,

Be it Therefore Resolved that the Common Council declares its intention to change the grade of said portion of Conger avenue to the grade as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Conger avenue with center line of California avenue with elevation 150.67; thence on a uniform grade to elevation 157.6 at a point N. 45 deg. 28 min. E. 55 feet distant from angle in Conger avenue at corner to E. R. Reames and Lindsay Applegate property as shown in Vol. 1, page 5, Record of Town Surveys; thence along the arc of a vertical curve,

at 25 feet, elevation 158.1
