Chas. Roberts, W. T. Shive and Omar Shive left today for a fishing trip to Clifton.

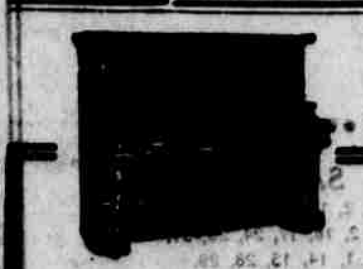
Get Nice Cakes

The committee issues a special appeal to all papers to suppress matters of that nature.

TEDDY PLEADS TO AMERICANISM

CRITICISE ACTIONS OF AMERICANS IN PAST REGARDING CONDUCT OF AFFAIRS AND PACIFICISM

LINCOLN, Neb., June 14.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, in a speech which he delivered here today at the celebration of the white centennial of the State of Nebraska, criticized the national policy of the United States for failure to protect promptly against German ruthlessness and brutality, deplored national failure to prepare for the war, pleaded for undivided loyalty to the American flag, denounced the pacifists, and asked for generous support and for the use of the Red Cross in caring for American troops on European battlefields.

"We permitted our national policy," he said, "to be swayed by the national devotion and national antipathies of men who exercised the rights of American citizens but showed themselves traitors to America by the way in which they prostituted our citizenship to the interests of Germany or to their hatred of England."

"It would be impossible to overstate the damage done to the morale fibre of our country by the professional pacifist propaganda, the peace-at-any-price propaganda. The professional pacifists during the first two and a half years of the war have occupied precisely the position of the copperheads during the

repetition of insult and injury that finally war was forced on us. It merely resulted in our drifting into war with Germany, in a condition of such complete unpreparedness that we owe an ignominious safety exclusively to the protection of the exhausted nations to whose help we have announced that we intend to come."

"From this time on let us insist on an absolute and undivided Americanism in this land, untampered by any self-allegiance to the countries from which our ancestors may severally have sprung, and untainted by any unworthy national animosity towards any other country. Let us prepare ourselves spiritually, economically and in all military and naval matters—including as a permanent policy the policy of universal military training and service—so that never again shall we be utterly unready, as we now are, to meet a great crisis. Finally, in the present war, a war for liberty and democracy against the ruthless militaristic tyranny of the Prussianized Germany of the Hohenzollerns, let us as speedily as possible train our giant, but our soft and unready, strength, so that we may use our hardened will to bring the slaughter to a halt and final end in the only humanly possible way by securing ourselves and our allies the peace of justice based on overwhelming power."

Will Settle the Question
According to Charles E. Hubbard all doubt and misapprehension concerning the outcome of the great war may now be dispelled. Mrs. Hubbard presented him with an \$400 bond last night, and in the opinion of Charles E. he will be able to settle the question just as good as he has been around here long enough to get acquainted with his surroundings.

MAN GETS CYCLE TAKEN IN 1915

LEON DECKER GIVES IT ONE KICK, AFTER TWO YEARS STORAGE IN SABO'S BARN, AND RIDES IT TO TOWN

A motorcycle stolen in September, 1915, was recovered today by Sheriff Humphrey and the owner, Leon Decker, hidden in the barn of Steve Sabo, at his place in Swan Lake. Sabo was arrested and brought to the city. He is hunting for bail, and his hearing has been set for Tuesday before Justice Gowen.

The motorcycle was stolen from West Main street while standing in the street, and nothing has been heard of it since, until recently some boys reported seeing one in Sabo's barn. The owner, Leon Decker, did not know it, but then got out a search warrant and found it this morning, locked up and hidden under sacks and machinery, in an almost unfindable place, and in a different place than first reported. Decker hopped it out, "kicked" it over, and rode it to the city, gasoline still being in the tank and it being necessary only to clean one spark plug to ride it. Decker said it had not been ridden since taken, although the headlight, tandem and part of the number is gone.
