BRUSH FIRES IN CALIFORNIA BURN PEOPLE, HOMES

THREE DEAD AND 60 HOMELESS IN OJAI VALLEY

Several Thousand Men From Ventura, Oxnard, and Other Towns are Fighting to Save the Country for Miles Around—Fire Within a Few Miles of Ventura—Third of One Town Burned—Fresh men Go to Front.

VENTURA, Cal., June 15.—Several thousand men from this city, Oxnard, Carpinteria, Ojai and other places are fighting to save the country for miles around from three strong brush fires which are now burning within a few miles of here.

Men are also fighting from Recruit-ment of the Ojai Valley where the fire, which burned a third of the town, has caused three deaths and made sixty families homeless.

Sheff Martin has just sent out a fresh force of men.

WAR WILL BRING GOOD TO AMERICA

BISHOP PADDOCK BELIEVES FRANCE HAS BEEN SAVED BY THE WAR DESPITE ITS WRONGS, AND WILL AID AMERICA.

That America's entrance into the war will be the saving of the nation, as it has been the salvation of France, is the belief of Bishop Paddock of Portland, who gave a popular lecture at the opera house Sunday night on "America and the War."

The war has served to put France on a practical and industrial plane such as the nation has never known before, according to the bishop. Previous to the war the abstinent habit, high living and easy going ways of the French people were burying thousands of the people in early graves, and the nation on the whole was rapidly deteriorating, said Bishop Paddock. Now the country is industrious and the people are working, rich and poor alike.

He believes the war will prove somewhat a similar benefit to this country, once more equalizing the rich and the poor, and bringing to them a realization of their duties and purpose in the world. Heretofore where certain classes of people of wealth have acquired the habit of squandering thousands of dollars yearly in frivolous and pleasures for themselves only, they will now be forced to use this money for purposes which will bring greater benefit and work towards the upbuilding of the race.

Bishop Paddock is familiar with the European countries at war having traveled and spent much time in Russia, France and others.

Incidents that occurred under the form of government were given by him from Russia under the old autocracy when men were arrested for such trivial matters as receiving books on governments. Government agents concluded that the individual was not satisfied with his own government and sent them to Siberia without a chance to arrange business matters or bid families farewells.

Bishop Paddock was subjected to censorship and his newspapers would often have but a few lines left in them to read, the rest being blotted out by the censors.

humanity. There is no conscription of recruits for the Red Cross by force of statute, but conscience, the little monitor of the realm of thought, exacts the duty as the price of mental peace.

"We have led the world in humanitarian work—feeding the starving, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked—regardless of race, government or religion.

"Blessed are the merciful!" As the dying have been comforted, the wounded healed, the weak protected and the helpless defended in every corner of the earth—strang and foreign beneficiaries of our conception of the brotherhood of man, who is he, living under the stars and stripes, who will not respond and give his mite or much to do the same for his own flesh and blood, kin and country?"

"Hoard our dollars and harden our hearts
In selfish greed, 'till life departs;
'Till right is wrong and the nation waste,
'Till love and justice and peace have passed.

"No; commercialism has not paled the flush of national pride; we love our country, our soldier and sailor boys and our flag more than we love a dollar! Duty to join the Red Cross, or to give money, should not be the only

motive. For the gift without the giver is bare; who gives himself with his gift feeds three—himself, his hungry neighbor and Me." But warm-heartedly and generously let us volunteer for the army of the Red Cross with the full spirit of a patriot, willing to give our all—time, energy and means."

STEFANSSON IS STILL IN ARCTIC

ARRIVAL OF McMillan Expedition Leaves the Noted Explorer Only One in Northern Seas.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 16.—The arrival in Greenland of the McMillan expedition, which left New York in July, 1913, to explore Crocker land, and which reported that this supposed continent, whose mountain tops Rear Admiral Robert E. Perry believed he had seen in 1906, did not exist, leaves Vilhjalmur Stefansson, at the head of a Canadian expedition, the only explorer in the Arctic Seas. It is believed that Stefansson and his twenty-four white men and nineteen Eskimos already are or soon will be heading eastward from Melville Island on board the motor vessel Polar Bear in an attempt to make the Northeast Passage from the Pacific to the Atlantic ocean.

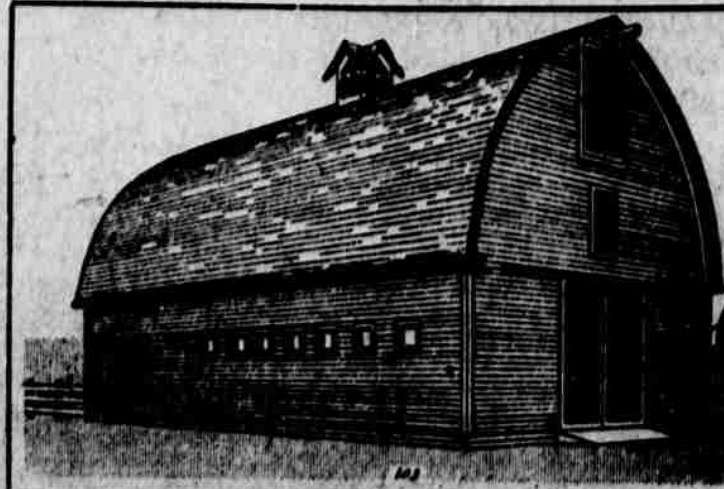
