## Food Preparedness Campaign

**OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 20.**—Much damage to vegetable gardens at this time of the year is caused by over-irrigation. This warning to vegetable growers is made by Professor A. G. Bouquet of O. A. C., who states further that "owing to the wet spring there is now plenty of moisture in Western Oregon soils, and that irrigation is not necessary, except on coarse, sandy ground. They are further urged to examine the soil carefully before watering, for, although it may seem dry on the surface, there is still plenty of moisture at a depth of two or three inches. Where water is necessary, the best results are obtained if the irrigation is followed by a good cultivation as soon as the soil is in working condition.

In most cases cultivation is at present an efficient means of giving vegetables planted some weeks ago the necessary moisture, and the dry surface layer will prevent loss of water by evaporation. Cultivation enables the plant to get moisture in the most approved way, namely by taking it from below at the deep roots.

It is best not to cultivate the garden early in the morning, while the dew is on the leaves, for it will tend to make the plant more susceptible to disease, and the foliage will become dirty and

the pores through which the plants breathe will be closed up.

Under no circumstances is a garden irrigated once a day; in many instances not even once a week, unless the soil is sandy and quite porous. Vegetables suffer from damping off, stem rot and other fungus diseases when the ground is continually wet and compact.

**THE HAGUE, Netherlands, May 25.**—(Correspondence)—Captain Krol of the Holland-America liner Ryndam has received from the president of the United States a gold watch and chain in recognition of his bravery on October 23, 1915, in saving the captain and crew of the American tugboat Vigilant. First Officer Jan Pieter Wegster of the Ryndam, received binocular marine glasses, while six other members of the crew were awarded gold medals.

## COMMITTEE TO OFFER CHANGES

GOVERNOR'S INVESTIGATION COMMITTEE TO SUGGEST CREATION OF OFFICE OF STATE AUDITOR AND NEW BUREAU

**SALEEM, June 20.**—Creation of the office of state auditor and the formation of a new state department of agriculture are two recommendations to be made by a committee appointed by Governor James Withycombe at the request of the last Oregon legislature to investigate proposed consolidation of official departments as a means of cutting down the cost of operating the state government.

Under the proposed department of agriculture would be consolidated the present dairy and food commission, the weights and measures department, the state fair board and the organizations now administering the various state agricultural and experiment stations. The proposed auditor would be selected by a committee of five elected by the people for that purpose.

Seven business men comprise the consolidation committee. They are Herman von Borstel and Charles E. Deen, Portland; A. J. Johnson, Corvallis; Mary T. Patton, Astoria; George Scroggins, La Grande; John Carlin, Medford, and A. E. Burton, Forest Grove.

## KOREA ARSENAL PLAN OF JAPAN

JAPANESE ARMY DIVISION CREATED IN 1916 FOR KOREA DISTRICT TO BE PROVIDED FOR IN EMERGENCIES

**TOKIO, June 20.**—In the supplementary budget estimate which is to be introduced in the coming special session of the diet is an item of 2,000,000 yen, or \$1,500,000, as expenditure for the establishment of an army arsenal in Korea. This is a new undertaking necessitated by the creation of two army divisions in Korea which were authorized in 1915.

In case of emergency in the future, the Korean divisions and the garrisons in Manchuria will be enabled to have a quick supply of guns and munitions and other ordnance without relying upon supplies from Japan.

The plan was long contemplated by the army authorities and the lessons furnished by the European war have necessitated its speedy execution.

Credits will also be asked for the construction of fortresses in Korea.

#### NORTHWEST COMMISSIONERS TALK GRAIN STANDARDS

**PORTLAND, June 20.**—Public Service commissioners of Oregon and Washington met here Monday in the first of a series of meetings to be held to discuss establishment of similar grain standards and inspection rules for the two states.

It is expected the standards set will control the movement of grain thru the Pacific Northwest, as Idaho and Montana have no grain inspection laws. Yesterday the commissioners met at Tacoma, today at Spokane, and tomorrow they will meet at Pendleton.

#### NEGROES NEED RURAL AND AGGIE SCHOOLS

**WASHINGTON, June 20.**—Investigation of fifty years of educational effort among negroes in the South, recently completed by the federal bureau of education, and made possible by the co-operation of the Phelps-Stokes fund of New York, emphasizes more than anything else the need of rural education, particularly the education of negro children in agriculture and simple trades, rather than the higher learning of the printed page.

## WAR REACHES PORTUGAL NOW

DRASTIC MEASURES GO INTO EFFECT TO INSURE BREAD FOR THE PEOPLE WHILE STREETS KEPT DARK AFTER NIGHTFALL

**LISBON, Portugal, June 20.**—The war has reached Portugal in earnest, and drastic measures are being put into effect by the government to insure bread for the people. Confectionery and cake no longer can be sold. All persons possessing supplies of flour are required to inform the authorities of the amount they own.

Corn bread is being made to make out the scanty supply of wheat flour, and acorn flour and other substitutes are being utilized.

The Lisbon streets, like those of London, now are in darkness after nightfall, as the gas factories have ceased operations. Electric street cars now are operated only up to 11 p. m. The difficulty of obtaining public conveyances after that hour is causing great loss to theaters and night clubs.

Imported coal has become an unknown quantity, and the national coal, lignite, is being used for domestic purposes. Warning has been given that unless it becomes possible to import coal, the use of electricity as motive power must be discontinued.

## MANY MINES ARE WASHED ON COAST

FOUR HUNDRED HAVE EXPLODED OR HAVE BEEN FISHED UP ON COAST OF GOTLAND—FOUR EXPLODE UNDER MAN'S EAVES

**STOCKHOLM, June 20.**—Four hundred mines have exploded or been fished up on the coast of Gotland since the war began. Seventy-five of them came ashore on a fifteen mile stretch of coast.

Nobody has been hurt by the explosions with the exception that some lives were lost just off the coast by the blowing up of the steamer Rumbia.

One peasant on the southern extremity of the eastern coast, whose house is at the water's edge, has experienced four explosions under his very eaves, but neither he nor any one of his family has been hurt.
