

OREGON CROPS NEED A RAIN

OPENING AND CLOSING DAYS OF WEEK GOOD, BUT DROP IN MERCURY ON 12TH HURT—WEATHER IDEAL FOR HAYING

PORTLAND, June 21.—Growing crops in Eastern and Southern Oregon are feeling the need of rain, according to the summary of crop conditions throughout the state for the week ending June 19, 1917, issued here yesterday by the Portland office of the government weather bureau. The summary follows:

"The opening and closing days of the week were warm and crop growth was stimulated, but low temperatures on the 12th, with frosts in Southern and Eastern counties caused some damage to garden truck in a few localities. The need of rain is now being felt in Southern and Eastern Oregon."
